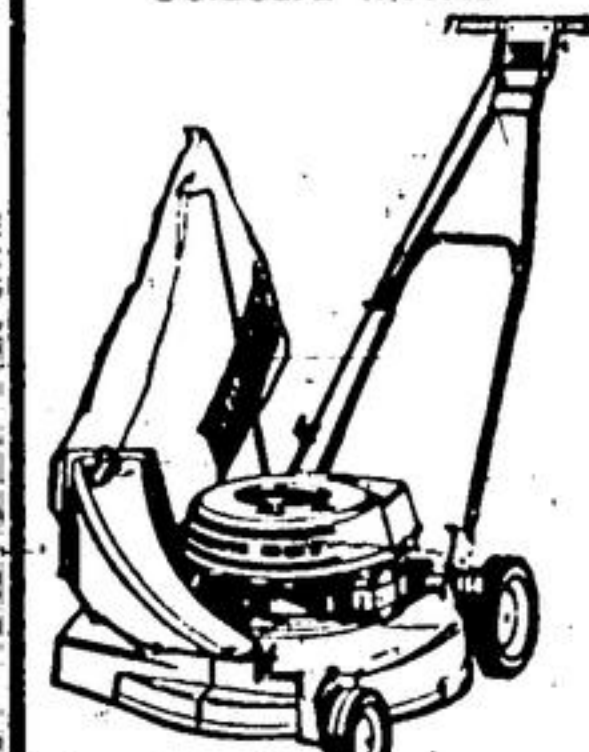

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Tells Trudeau Housing, Taxes Halton Concern

Halton MP Rud Whiting was a guest of Prime Minister Trudeau for lunch at 24 Sussex Dr., Ottawa last week.

Whiting, along with Norman Caix of Ontario riding and Bud Cullen of Sarnia, spent an hour and a half with the Prime Minister.

It was one of a series of luncheon meetings the Prime Minister is having each week with backbench Liberal MPs.

Whiting said that while he has spoken to Trudeau a number of times briefly since his election to the Commons, it was the first time that he had been able to have a lengthy discussion with Trudeau and he found the experience very rewarding.

He said the talk ranged from the role of a backbench member, to constituency problems and to international affairs.
