# KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Registration for admission to Kindergarten in September. 1969, in the Elementary Public Schools of Halton County, will take place on Monday, May 5, 1969, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 12 noon; and 1.15 p.m. and 5 p.m. in the school which serves the attendance area in which the child resides.

Public school supporters may register their children who will have attained the age of 5 years on or before the last day of February, 1970. Proof of public school support will be accepted in the form of a 1969 tax bill or 1968 assessment notice, or a declaration from the Municipal Clerk's office; a birth certificate or a baptismal cetificate will be acceptable as proof of age.
