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Fined, Licence Refused In Deer Hunting Charge

Two Milton men were both fined \$250. after pleading guilty to three charges each under the Fish and Game Act.

Both pleaded guilty to snaring deer, hunting deer during the closed season and illegal possession of venison, when they appeared before Judge J.R. Black on April 16.

On February 2, a conservation officer from the department of Lands and Forest found blood and what appeared to be deer hairs in the snow at the end of an abandoned road in Esquesing Township. After following the trail he came upon a deer snare set in a tree. At the base of the tree was the remains of a deer.

On Tuesday, February 4, five conservation officers took up surveillance and about 4 p.m. two men were seen arriving in a car and entering the bush with a rifle.

A short time later a shot was heard and the men were later seen standing at the area where the snares were.

The men were then stopped and it was noted they didn't have a small game licence needed to carry a rifle.

They stated they had found the snares about two weeks earlier and there had been a dead deer in one snare and they had cut parts off and brought some home.

The accused stated they had seen a face in the bush on the day they were stopped and not knowing what it was they had shot, and had found out it was a deer.

When conservation officers followed their trail into the woods they found a freshly killed deer across the tracks of the two men.

A search warrant later turned up 50 pounds of venison at the home of one and 25 pounds at the other.

The two were also told they would not be permitted a licence to hunt for one year. The Crown Attorney said they should be dealt with severely because of the pain that deer are put through before dying in a snare.

Breaks Leg, Expectant Elk Must be Destroyed

An expectant elk, one of the newer acquisitions at Halton Region Conservation Authority's 70 acre wild animal preserve at Rattlesnake Point Park, had to be shot last Saturday when it was discovered the animal had broken a leg.

Authority resources manager Dave Murray said the leg was either broken in a fight with another animal, or in a ground-hog hole. "We were sorry to lose this one: it was pregnant," Murray said.

The carcass was taken to the Authority's game farm at Mountsberg, and fed to the bears and wolf in residence there.

This was not one of the original five elk the Authority imported from an Alberta game preserve — it arrived at Rattlesnake on Easter weekend following a 'swapping deal' with a private northern Ontario owner. H.R.C.A. traded two buffalo calves for three new elk and followed their trail into the woods they found a freshly killed one of the three.

Cost Studies Determine Best Crops for Farmers

Crop cost studies are to be the feature of the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association program for the coming year. Farmers will keep track of the number of hours, machines used, cost of herbicides, insecticides, etc. on the various crops grown on their farm. A record book is being provided to all the co-operators.

Last year there were 24 entries in this section. Results showed the cost of growing grain corn to be \$70 an acre, corn silage \$90 an acre, hay \$60 an acre, and spring grain to be \$54 an acre.

High yield competitions are to be held in 1969 for grain corn and spring grain. The winner in the competition with the highest number of entries will receive a gold watch, complements of the UCO, Halton Branch.

Anyone growing soybeans in Halton is eligible for a grant of \$20 to assist with the purchase of herbicide. A bus trip for all members is planned for later in the summer. Any wishing to take part in these projects should apply as soon as possible to the Agricultural office in Milton.
