

# Students Walkers Raise \$1600 for Cancer

An army of fund raising hikers struggled through Georgetown on Saturday enroute from Markham, Newmarket and Thornhill to Acton to earn an estimated \$1,600 for the Cancer Society.

Some 170 student marchers plus several stalwart adults jogged, walked and limped the return-trail-to-Acton collecting waters, aching muscles and sweat.

Fifty-three foot soldiers including two public schoolers completed the route, before 3:30 p.m. curfew.

The high school's third and most successful cancer walk drew strong community support from dawn to dusk. Backup squads of moms, dads, uncles,

An advance guard 16 hikers struck out Friday night from Markham and Newmarket plodding through rain, snow, and hail into the chilly dawn.

The main body of marathoners plus parents left Acton at 6 a.m. Saturday travelling by bus and car to Thornhill for the take-off.
