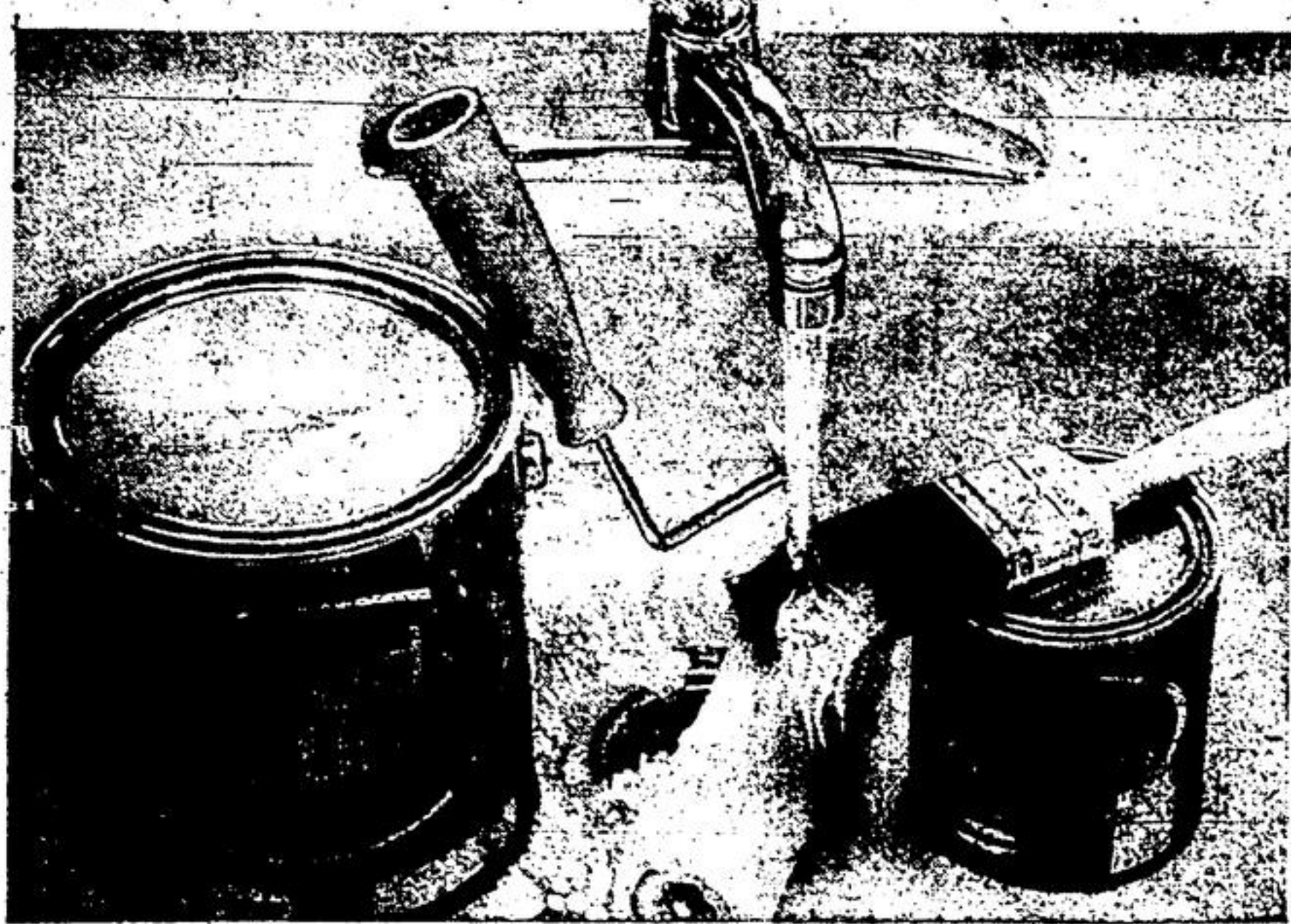

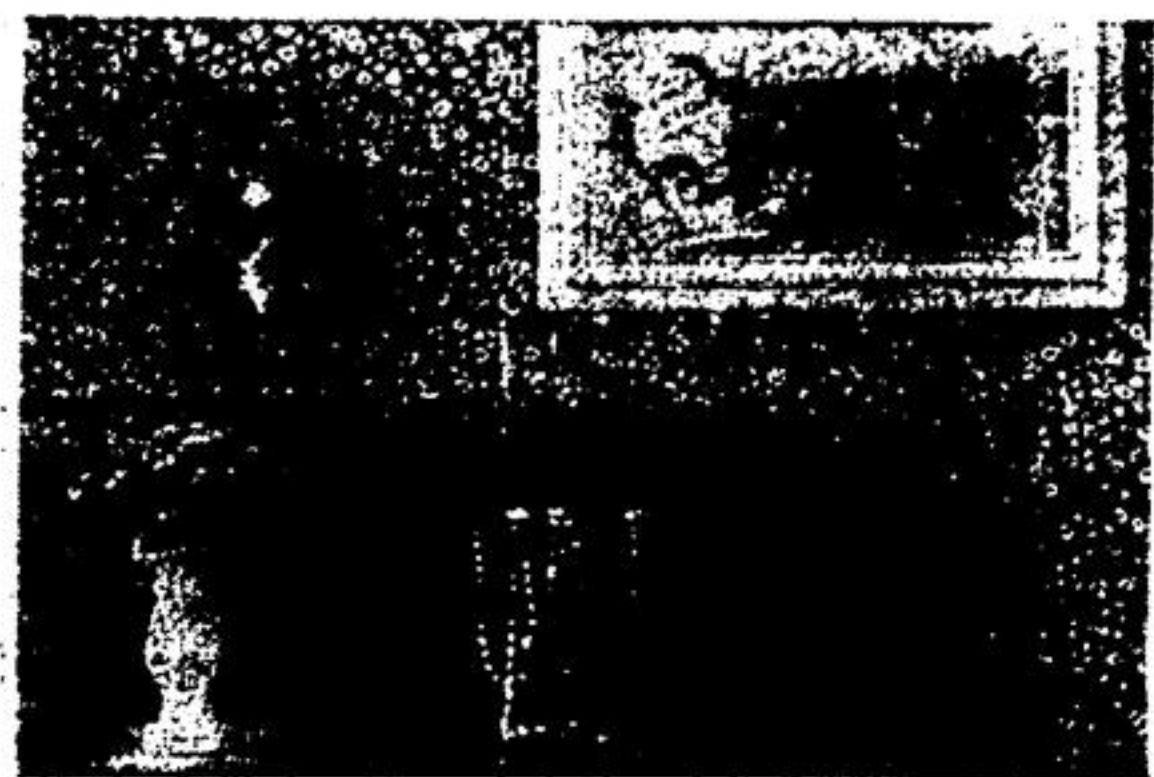

Retain Strap, But Only 'Last Resort' Measure

The strap will be retained in Halton county schools, as a 'last resort' the Board of Education decided Thursday night, over the objection of trustee W. B. Edwards.

J. C. Ronson, chairman of the committee of board policies, claimed teachers and principals had been asked their opinion on the subject, and had come out in favour of maintaining corporal punishment as a last resort. He emphasized the opinion was not unanimous.

"How do we stand in light of the minister of education's statement on the subject, favouring the abolition of the strap" asked Georgetown representative Ernie Bodnar.

"Very simply," replied chairman Fred Armitage, "the board is autonomous."

D. S. Lawless, assistant director of education, claimed the

memorandum from the minister discourages, does not prohibit the use of the strap.

"The purpose of this ruling is to give the principals support," explained the assistant director, "if there is no statement, there is no support," he added.

J. C. Ronson contended ridicule or sarcasm could be a much more severe form of punishment. "No good teacher would use ridicule or sarcasm," he stated, "similarly strapping is very rare in Halton county."

W. B. Edwards felt there should be more restrictions on the use of the strap. "I cannot reconcile strapping on a basis of temper and emotion" he stated.

"We'll be mighty surprised if it's used to any significant degree in the future at all" added James Singleton, director of education.

"The board does not approve of corporal punishment any more than the minister of education or anyone else" he said, "but the board must make provision for it as a last resort stand only for responsible teachers."

Singleton said the position of the Department of Education on corporal punishment had been rather delicate, and that education minister Davis therefore "suggested that in his opinion corporal punishment in the old fashioned sense does not have a part in the educational trends and methods of the future," said Singleton.
