DELEGATE AT BAHAI RALLY AND ELECTION

Penticton, British Columbia, was the site of the 1969 National Convention of the Baha'is of Canada from Thursday, April 24 through Sunday, April 27.

Annual conventions are held by the Baha'is throughout the world at this time to coincide with the Feast of Ridvan, a twelve-day period commemorating the declaration of Baha'ullah, founder of the Baha' Faith, in the Garden of Ridvan in Baghdad, 1863.

In Canada, this national meeting convenes in a different region each year, bringing together a large number of delegates and observers of many backgrounds across the country from the Yukon and Arctic to Newfoundland. Of the ninety-five official delegates to the Canadian convention, elected on the basis of representation by population, close to fifteen per cent are of Indian, negro and oriental origin.

The primary responsibility of the delegates is the election by secret ballot and without a nominated slate of candidates, of the nine members to serve on the Canadian National Spiritual Assembly for the coming year through April 1970. Every adult voting Baha' in Canada is eligible for election, to this supreme national administrative body—the nine persons receiving the highest number of votes being elected.

Want One-County Education When Peel and Halton Merge

Halton and Peel counties' educational systems must remain separate and intact even when the two counties merge into one regional system of government.

The Halton County Board of Education intends to back this contention in a proposed brief to the minister of municipal affairs, Darcy McKeough.

The brief was tabled at last week's board meeting in Georgetown and discussion will be held till the next meeting.

The Halton brief states that the board believes the operation of a county school system is "theoretically possible regardless of the structure of other municipal affairs."

Prepared by a committee of five board trustees and three administrative staff members headed by Esquering trustee William Lawson, the brief refers to McKeough's tentative proposals recommending the setting up of a Metro Toronto-type system of regional government for Halton and Peel.

McKEOUGH DISAGREES

Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough has spoken out against an independent Halton regional government.

He said he does not believe that Halton can be reformed alone to create an "enduring region."

He had defined an enduring region as a government area able to stand on its own two feet in its own operations and its dealings with its neighbours.

He made the remarks at the Burlington Chamber of Commerce annual dinner.

McKeough proposed a super metro type Halton Peel region in January.

Last week Halton County council voted in favour of a separate Halton region.

McKeough will be in Georgetown Wednesday, May 7 to address a Chamber of Commerce dinner here.

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Rockwood Assembles Shipment to Korea
Rockwood International Ltd., of Georgetown shipped 680 purebred Holsteins from Vancouver to South Korea, April 15. The Georgetown firm, which was awarded the tender by the government of the Republic of Korea, assembled 610 bred heifers from Ontario and the rest from B.C. and Alberta. Nearly 100 were bought from Georgetown-Brampton area farmers. Selections were made by a five man group of Korean officials headed by Mr. Byung Nam Min of the National Agricultural Co-operative at Seoul. Local manager, E. C. Olivier said the cattle will be distributed to individual farmers to increase milk productivity. The average price was \$500.

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
