

# Jarvie Again Named Head For Tri-County Hockey Assoc.

The 13th annual meeting of the Tri-County Minor Hockey Association was held Sunday, April 2nd at the Milton Legion Hall. Ten of the 11 towns in the league were represented, with Burlington absent.

Championship crests were presented to the five teams that finished first in their respective age groups, Burlington Juveniles, Georgetown Midgets, Oakville Bantams, Milton PeeWees, and Brampton Novices.

In addition, league secretary Herb Robinson of Georgetown announced the results of the voting for MVP in each group.

MVP's for this year are Paul Cook of Brampton, in Novice; Ricky Bridgman of Milton, in Pee-Wee; Glen Wilkie of Hespeler in Bantam; Paul Fendley of Georgetown in Midget; and George Naka of Chinguacousy, in Juvenile.

Acton announced their intention to remain in the league for the 1969-70 season, but asked the executive to consider a change in scheduling whereby

the 'A' and 'B' teams in the group would not have to play so many games against the 'AAA' teams, Brampton, Burlington, Guelph, and Oakville.

However, Milton and Hespeler, both 'A' towns indicated that they would oppose such a move, since they felt that games against 'AAA' teams gave their teams top-notch competition and thereby improved the play of their own teams.

It was decided that next year, in addition to the arena passes issued to the players of each team, five passes of a different color will be given to each team to be used by the car drivers. The coach and manager of each team will use their OMHA cards as a means of admission.

Three amendments to the constitution were made.

First of all, each town which is not represented, at a meeting will not only be assessed a fine of \$5.00, but also additional fee of \$2 every meeting that the five dollars is not paid.

Secondly, the manager of the home club shall ensure that the timekeeper, charged with operating the clock for all games shall be a responsible and capable person.

Finally, the person or persons nominated for Life Membership shall be presented to the annual meeting by notice of motion. Such notice of motion for Life Membership may only be presented by the officers.

The meeting concluded with the election of officers for the 1969-70 season. Group convenor Jim Kinkley chaired the meeting for the elections.

The entire executive was returned by acclamation namely: President, Don Jarvie of Georgetown; first vice president Bill Rawney of Milton; Second vice president, Don Hargreaves of Burlington; Third vice president, Lloyd Maybe of Guelph; Treasurer, Vern Gowing of Preston; Secretary, Herb Robinson of Georgetown.

## Halton Rural Loop Expands

The slate of officers will remain unchanged for the 1969 season of the Halton Rural Softball League.

Elected to serve another term in office at the annual meeting of the league were president George Rimmer, vice president Jack Marchmont and secretary treasurer Rick Johnston.

Teams from Lowville, Palermo, Procor, Omagh, Halton Hotel and Hornby were represented at the meeting and have indicated they will enter clubs in the league for the 1969 season.

A new entry, Kennedy Ford of Oakville will also be playing this year in the loop. This brings the total entries in the league to seven teams.

Each club will play a 24 game schedule on Tuesday, Friday and Sunday evenings. The schedule is set to get underway May 23.

The league has also elected to use the new pitching distance and ball size as dictated by the 1969 Ontario Amateur Softball Association regulations.

## Plan Season Opening For Soccer Leagues

An exciting meeting of the soccer association was held on Monday April 21 to discuss final details for the forthcoming season.

It was decided that the season will open on Saturday, May 17, with a ceremonial kick-off followed by three league games, one each in the atom, mosquito and peewee divisions.

The first half of the season will continue for approximately eight weeks after the starting date, this length of time being required to fill all fixtures.

Although registration was officially open two weeks ago it was decided to accept further registration until a maximum of fifteen players per team is reached. At this point registration will close.

Work has begun on the dressing rooms at Cedarvale park.

The room was cleaned out last week and floor laying began earlier this week.

It now appears certain that the facilities will be ready for the opening of the season.

The pitch at the park, considerably softened by recent rain has been cut up badly by persons outside association jurisdiction. Last year's executive spent many hours with council and the Cedarvale committee to make these facilities available and it seems only fair to these people that they be kept in the best condition possible.

The association requests that users of the park avoid the playing area, at least until it is in playable condition, so that a greater majority of Georgetown boys may benefit from these excellent facilities.

There is to be a general meeting of the association on Sunday, May 4 in the legion hall. This is an important meeting and all coaches, managers and supporters should attend.
