

Jim Davies Best in School Trip Walkathon

Seventy-one people and two dogs started the twenty mile Walkathon to raise money for a Howard Wrigglesworth school trip, and 68 people and 2 dogs finished. The Saturday walk saw Grade 7 and 8 pupils walking as their means of visiting Upper Canada Village, Cornwall and Fort Henry, at Kingston.

They estimate between \$1,200 and \$1,400 was raised by their blistered feet, with Jim Davies coming in first, in the amazing time of 4 1/2 hours, averaging almost five miles an hour.

The three teachers, Misses Steenburgh, Hagar and Elliott did not let their side down, they all finished the walk. Following the winner by only four minutes were Wayne Aitchison, Ron Aitchison and Rick Nicholl.

At seven o'clock in the morning they started out from Howard Wrigglesworth school, travelled down to Hornby, east on Steele's Ave. to McCallum's Esso station, then north to Norval, and back along Guelph St. to the school.

While the walkathon brought the May 28, 29, 30 trip much closer to reality, more money is needed. Friday the mothers of Grade 7 and 8 students are holding a bake sale, and May 10 there will be a penny carnival on the grounds of Wrigglesworth school.

"After all that, we hope to have enough to go on our trip," commented Grade 8 teacher, Mr. Hagar.

Failure to receive a tax bill does not exempt you from paying penalties.

PAYMENT OF TAXES

Taxes may be paid in three payments and are due on or before May 15, July 15 and Sept. 15, 1969. These taxes may be paid in person or by mail. If paying by mail please be sure your tax roll number is written on your cheque or money order. If paying in person please bring your tax bill with you. A discount of 1/2% will be allowed if TOTAL TAXES are paid on or before May 14th, 1969. When taxes are included in your mortgage payments and you receive the tax bill, please forward your tax bill at once to your mortgage company to avoid paying penalty.
