**Discuss Solution for Problem of Garbage**

Two fires last week, in which refuse had been set on fire, led to a council discussion Monday.

Deputy Reeve Arthur Speight suggested a daily pick up in the commercial areas. And Mayor Emmerson said conditions on Armstrong Avenue, a main artery to the newer industrial area, would be brought to the attention of the police department, as warning signs are being disregarded.

Main Street leaves a lot to be desired said Mr. Speight, and on pick up days the sidewalks are piled with garbage.

"I agree it sometimes looks like a battle zone," said the mayor. "We shouldn't allow garbage to be put on the street in a haphazard manner."

Waste containers downtown had been removed last fall, and only a few have been replaced and Cr. Donna Demison said more should be purchased.

Last week the mayor said he is planning a beautification campaign for the town, and will enlist co-operation of residents in this.
