

Open Halton Deer Season If Others Agree

An open season for deer hunting will be held in Halton county Nov. 3, 4 and 5 if adjoining counties also agree to hold one.

Some counties have already agreed to the proposal, but the department of lands and forests has still to get the approval of Wellington and Wentworth counties.

The open season would be the first since 1967.

Hunting would be with shot-guns only.

The department of lands and forests has specified that only slugs are to be used as ammunition because in the past many deer have been maimed by shot or steel-jacket shells without sufficient killing power.

Conservation Officer Gingrich of the department of lands and forests, who approached Halton County Agriculture Committee for approval of the open season, said the season would cut down on killing of deer by poachers.

Track, Field Team Entered in CWOSSA

Despite the handicap of inadequate facilities, Georgetown high school is in the process of assembling a track and field team to carry the red and blue in the District 10 CWOSSA meet May 15 at the University of Guelph.

Without a proper field the physical education staff has foregone a school meet, but are determining the team's makeup through after school trials.

A new track and playing field are to be part of an upcoming construction project at the high school.

Georgetown Lions Club want to use it for a sports day June 28, and Georgetown Jaycees plan to use it for a bicycle rodeo for public school children in the daytime of May 19th.

All requests were turned over to Tom James, who now looks after the scheduling of park activities.

Rainbows Biting Well For Week-End Anglers

Trout fishing in the Muskoka district was fair to poor due to high water and adverse weather conditions. The small streams were also high but were the best producers. Some lakes were still ice covered.

The writer caught some nice ones in a small stream near the Algonquin Park boundary using a Royal Coachman, marbu streamer — the fly they can't resist.

The best fishing was had by the Rainbow trout anglers in the Georgian Bay area. Lorne Fletcher of Acton, who is one of the best, took an eight pound six and a four pound fish at Thornbury on opening weekend.

Don Wilson of Ashgrove caught some nice ones locally, and Bert Adcock of Georgetown landed a nice one on the Sydenham River at Owen Sound. Bert gave me permission to say he caught his at the mill dam. It's no secret. Only 40,000 other fishermen know the same spot. It weighed 5 1/2 pounds.

Our fishing permit allows us to angle inside Algonquin Park. That will really pay off for several Muskoka anglers.

Huntsville News: Department of Lands and Forests officer Bill Ellerington and Ranger Joe Cotterchio were the main figures in the rescue of Mr. Hank Bennetts, manager of the A&P store there. He was helpless in the bush for 18 hours until found in the Boyne Creek and Miller Hill area, described as the worst hell hole in the district. All told 150 men took part in the rescue. Apparently Bill Ellerington and Ranger Cotterchio pinpointed Mr. Bennetts' probable position and found him at 12:10 p.m.

Now, about that fishing licence. Years ago in the big Royal Hotel in Hamilton, I was at an Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters annual meeting where I asked the Rt. Honourable Minister Scott, at that time Minister of Lands and Forests about the probability of bringing out a 50c licence. I suggested the fee could go towards raising more trout for our streams. He said, "George, that is a very touchy subject" and refrained from discussing it further.

Now all of a sudden they raise the deer, moose, park fees, and impose a fishing licence to provide us greedy residents with the different things we ask for or expect. Sure, they need money. We know it only too well. Everyone wishes them the best. I do myself. It is a thankless job anyway. So the result is everyone is ready with the \$3 to purchase the legal document. But, lo and behold, where are they? Can you buy one when you want one? Apparently not.

On Mondays when the sports shops are closed they are not available. On opening Saturday some main sports shops out of town told the anglers, "Sorry we're sold out." The Department of Lands and Forests knew one year ago about the introduction of fishing licenses. Why were they in such short supply?

Anyway why should such a few be allowed to handle the

licenses, and so many, such as restaurant operators who are open from 12 to 24 hours a day be refused. These people are on main interchanges on highways where anglers pass. The boys don't like the run around they are getting. Anglers should be able to get a license at their convenience, not when the stores are open to sell them one. So let's hope they spread them around. No one wants to drive 25 miles and more into Georgetown, Orangeville, Acton, Guelph and other places for a piece of paper giving them the right to fish. It's a Canadian right to fish anyway — so said former Minister of Lands and Forests Mr. Scott years ago.

This story came from the wife of a Rainbow trout fisherman not far from here. He was working, so he sent someone in to buy a license for him. To quote this person, the license was refused. So then the son-in-law went in on the same errand and was reportedly given a rough time. Finally one of the clerks said, "Oh, for heaven's sake, sell him one." What matters is that the proper name is entered in the record book. That is the name of the person who is going to be using the permit. After all, what are we asking for, a permit to carry a concealed weapon or a permit to allow us to fish?

You can't put trout in the creel as long as narrowmindedness and red tape prevents us from getting a license.

Better get the fly dope out. Black flies were out at Terra Cotta, Sunday night.

Tight lines and good fishing.
