

# Norval Goes "All Out" To Ensure Success of Oxfam Walk

Congratulations Oxfam walkers, whether you finished the walk or walked until you could go no farther, your spirit and determination to carry on with aching leg muscles and blistered feet, showed your concern for the hungry of the world.

Thirty pupils from Norval public school walked and 15 of them finished. This is a remarkable achievement. All 3 teachers also walked. Mrs. Glass found that Georgetown was as far as she could make it but principal Mrs. Hillson, and Miss G. Robertson walked 27 miles finishing at Parkholm School. Their perseverance inspired the pupils to keep going as the children didn't want to admit that their teacher could walk farther than they could. Stiff, sore and sunburned, the teachers were at school Monday morning again setting a good example to their pupils that you carry on and do the best you can.

Mrs. R. Frost who supervises the pupils at the school during the noon hour, met the children at the various check points in her station wagon to supply them with drinks, chocolate bars and aids, and encouragement and picked up those who could go no farther.

Mrs. F. Fendley, caretaker at the school, was also on the Norval checkpoint committee, worked tirelessly all day, then had the school to clean on Sunday, as it was the official check point in the village. A big hand for Norval Public School!

5,200 walkers checked through at Norval. Another big hand for the terrific job done by the

workers at the school and for those in the community who responded to the appeal for food. There were cookies, cakes, sandwiches, tea biscuits and for some lucky walkers, hot muffins. The supply of food dwindled out as the last walkers trailed through. Only a few cookies were left and they were taken on with other supplies to another checkpoint. Freshie and coffee were also supplied free. One of the busiest spots was the first aid corner with Mrs. Wes Louth in charge. They had tubs, buckets, basins etc. of baking soda foot baths for weary feet. They used 7 large packages of band-aids, 7 packages of corn starch which was used as foot powder, supplied aspirin tablets and even safety pins on request.

Some of the workers ended the day with blistered feet, leg muscles in knots and sunburned, but with the satisfaction that Norval community had done their bit to help along the walkers. Most children and young folk and many adults in the district were walking so what the community did to help them they did for others also.

Unsung heroes of the Norval checkpoint were 11 year old Bobby Lee and high school student Marie Fendley. Bobby ran errands to the stores for more supplies, assisted everyone he saw who needed a hand and ended the day helping to clean up the litter that couldn't be believed unless you saw it. His feet were so sore he could hardly take another step. Marie was a wonderful help to all workers all day and was on hand early to

get the checkpoint set up as nothing in this line could be done the night before due to rain.

As soon as the blisters and leg muscles improve, the young folk will be around collecting their pledges. Don't let them down. They earned every penny of it.

The first one to finish the walk from Norval school was Danny Hamilton and the last ones were his sister, Nancy Hamilton and Cathy Wolans who finished at 9:50 p.m. and the youngest was 7 year old Kenneth Owens. The others were Marianne Robinson, Bandy Fendley, Tommy Owens, Vince Lefebvre, Donna Ridley, Tommy Frost, Kelly Frost, Danny Cooper, Kelly Sedore, John Kranendonk and Michael Guthrie and his father Norman Guthrie who said he would walk as far as the boys went. Michael took him all the way!
