Grass Fires Illegal But Hard to Control

Open grass fires are illegal in Halton County.

A. stated in Clause 13 of the Ontario Air Pollution Control Act 1967 — No person shall burn or permit to be burned in an open fire any material except with the permission and under the direction of a provincial officer.

R.F. Boyd of the Air Pollution Control Service in Halton defended this policy, although he admitted that enforcement has not been as strict as it should be up to this time.

"In our view, after consultation with the department of agriculture, grassfires can be justified for agricultural purposes. No permission is granted for the burning of leaves in residential areas. This prohibition of leaf fires is common to nearly all air pollution control legislation or policies in residential areas throughout the continent."

He went on to state that although open burning has been used for ages as a means of disposing of unwanted material at low cost, it is now regarded as an undesirable practice from an air pollution standpoint. An individual open fire may cause a local nuisance or a visibility problem on highways.

The over all effect of indiscriminate use of open burning is of considerable importance as a source of air pollution. Mr. Boyd concluded "We look forward to the day when open burning will be almost eliminated. This objective can only be reached with the co-operation of understanding citizens and with the development of suitable alternative means of disposal."

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Lorne Scots Home From Hong Kong
