## LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The better weather seems to bring out the bridge players. Acton Bridge Club had its largest game of the season with five and one half tables in action. We welcomed back Frank and Edna Hampshire from their vacation on the Canary Islands. From all accounts, it's a great place.

Here is a hand that gave two declarers a little trouble. Since game should make it worth writing about.

East deals with both sides vulnerable.

South's bid over East's opening bid is entirely a matter of partnership agreement. Some players double to show an opening bid, some use intermediate jump overcalls, others just

simple overcalls. The sequence shown here uses the intermediate jump-overcall. This shows a good solid suit and opening bid strength or better. North has a little strength and can show it by a simple raise. He need not worry about raising with only two trump since his partner has shown a long spade suit.

West led the ten of diamonds and East won with the ace. Declarer won the diamond return and took stock. Unfortunately for two of them, all they could see was to take out trump and hope something good would happen. On the run of spades West discarded two clubs and a diamond, while East led off of one heart, three diamonds and a club.

Declarer led a club and West won. West got off the lead with the heart jack and no matter what declarer did he was doomed. If he covered in dummy, East could win and get off the lead with a diamond. If declarer played low, so would East and now East held a heart ten ace over dummy.

How different it was when declarer did a little planning at the beginning. Dummy has two sure entries in trump. They should be used. When declarer is in at trick two he should lead a club. If West wins, then declarer can pitch a heart on dummy's king of clubs. If West

plays low, declarer's club loser vanishes.

One declarer succeeded in making five spades. The defense must not only have missed the club trick but must also have either led hearts or discarded too many of them.

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### Bahai's Express Concern For Canada's Indians

"The heritage of the Canadian Indian has been greatly misinterpreted," commented Miss Nancy Campbell at a meeting held by the Bahai's of Georgetown and Oakville at the Delrex Restaurant, Sunday. She went on to deal particularly with the teachings of Degawanda, the Indian prophet to the Iroquois, pointing out the similarity to many of the teachings of Christ.

Miss Campbell, who is the head of a dancing studio in Hamilton, has made an intensive study of Indian beliefs and presented information as to the origin, numbers and way of life of the Canadian Indian. She emphasized their need for a sense of identity. Miss Campbell suggested that a knowledge of and respect for Indian cultural background by both Indian and white would contribute to better understanding.

Baha'ullah, the founder of the Baha' faith, emphasized that the common rights of man can only be secured through a change in human conscience. Human conscience can only be changed through the Revelation of God. It is because of this teaching and the conviction that "Human Rights are God-given Rights" that Bahai's are greatly concerned with the plight of our native Canadians.

As a part of the program a National Film Board film, depicted some of the beliefs of "Atliuk" was also shown. This the Montagnais tribe of Quebec, particularly as it related to the hunt for the cariboo.

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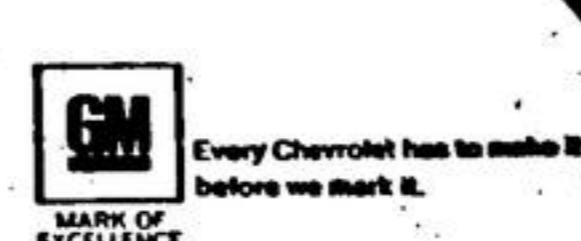
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
