"The heritage of the Canadian Indian has been greatly misinterpreted," commented Miss ton were in Scarborough Satur-Nancy Campbell at a meeting day morning, May 3 at the funheld by the Baha'is of George eral of Mr. Fred Marchington. town and Oakville at the Delrex Restaurant, Sunday. She went on to deal particularly with the teachings of Deganawida, the Indian prophet to the Iroquois, pointing out the similiarity to friends and neighbours enjoyed many of the teachings of Christ.

Miss Campbell, who is the head of a dancing studio in Hamilton, has made an intensive study of Indian beliefs and presented information as to the origin, numbers and way of life of the Canadian Indian. She emphasized their need for a sense of identity. Miss Campbell suggested that a knowledge of and respect for Indian cultural background by both Indian and white would contribute to better. understanding.

Baha'u'llah, the founder of the Baha'i faith, emphasized that the common rights of man can only be secured through a change in human conscience. Human conscience can only be changed through the Revelation of God. It is because of this teaching and the conviction that "Human Rights are God - given-Rights" that Baha'is are greatly concerned with the plight of our native Canadians.


