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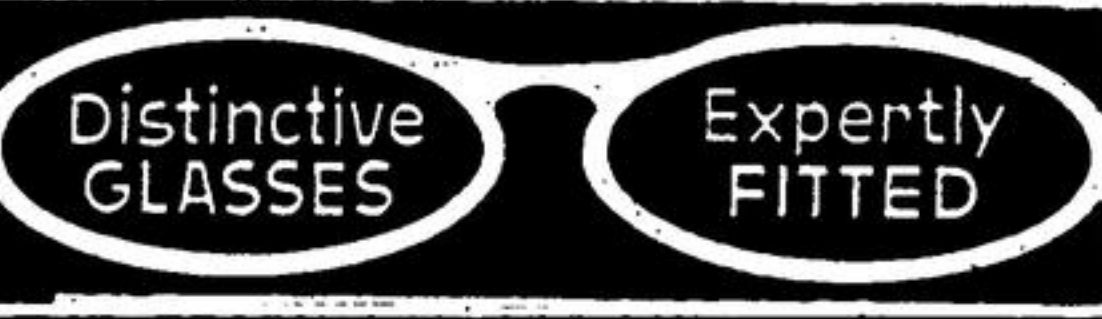

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### \$26,000 Record For Heifer Calf

Oak Ridges Citation Lanette, a six month old heifer calf owned by Claude F. Pickett of Georgetown was sold for \$26,000 at the National Holstein sale held in Guelph this week.

This is the highest price ever paid for a heifer calf in Canada and is believed to be a joint record. The joint purchasers were Jerry Tucker of St. Catharines and James W. Carney of Georgetown.

Rockwood International, of Georgetown, paid \$2,500 for a Holstein on behalf of an unnamed Italian buyer.

Spring Creek Farms, Streetsville, also sold a Holstein to a Japanese buyer for \$1,800, and another Holstein to R. F. Brown of Paris for \$1,000.

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
