**Five Cars Derailed In Freight Accident**

A Canadian Pacific Railways freight train derailed in Milton Monday morning, injuring one crewman and causing five cars at the rear of the train to leave the tracks entirely.

The crewman was taken to hospital but was released after being treated for cuts and bruises.

The accident occurred around 5:45 a.m. when the rear end of the train consisting of four cars and a caboose left the tracks while the rest of the train continued on for some distance before coming to a stop.

The accident happened in front of the CPR station.

About 100 yards of track were affected blocking traffic with severed wheel carriages and twisted rails.

Three of the derailed cars remained upright. The fourth car and a caboose flipped onto their sides on an embankment.

There were five crewman on the train, two of whom were in the derailed rear section.

A CPR spokesman in Toronto blamed the derailment on a broken rail. The train, on its way from Windsor to Montreal was made up of 70 cars.
