EVERYONE IS WELCOME

is The End In Sight For Missions?



by Rev. Paul W. Collins, Christian & Missionary Alliance

A national church leader speaking to his denominational conference raised the question of whether the end is in sight for foreign missionary work around the world.

The day is coming when the work of all men will cease. Jesus says so. But Jesus does not say that the work of foreign missions will cease before any other work. We have greater opportunity for evangelism and church planting overseas today than at any other time in earth's history.

Consider Viet Nam. Viet Nam has known war for more than twenty eight years - twenty eight years of death and destruction and despair. And for twenty-eight years the prophets of doom have dolefully predicted the demise of missionary work in Viet Nam. Happily a strong core of Christian and Missionary Alliance leadership failed to be convinced; otherwise we would not have 340 churches, 300 national pastors, and 42,000 baptized members in that country. If the present is any indication, we are on the threshold of what will be a phenomenal growth rate for the church here.

Elsewhere it is the same. Latin America is more open to Christian missions than it has ever been. The churches in Africa are asking for additional missionaries. In the Orient we have witnessed the almost unbelievable purge of Communism from Indonesia, with its implications for a new, bright era of Christian missions in that island nation.

The most valid argument in favour of an optimistic view of missionary activity transcends any political, technical or social considerations. I refer to the Great Commission of Jesus Christ. Jesus commanded His followers to go and make disciples of all nations. He did not make the command conditional on favourable reception by the host nation or on our financial means. He just said "Go." As long as the Task. Great Commission is in the Book, Christians have business in those places where the gospel of God's saving grace and man's need of repentance and conversion, has not been preached - and God's Word is not about to pass away. The future of missions never looked brighter than it does right




