Denis Hughes, 24 Eleanor Crescent, an engineer on a Super-Constellation plane which carries food to starving people in Biafra, spoke to members of Countess of Strathmore Chapter, IODE, at their May 12 meeting.

Mr. Hughes, whose wife was also a meeting guest, said the plane was purchased by donations from Canadians, Oxford, and various churches. The crew is all-Canadian. Eighty thousand pounds of highly concentrated food is carried into Biafra every night, providing food for 400,000 people a day. Cost is \$4,000 per night, or one cent per person. With the aid of colour movies, members were moved to pity to witness the suffering among women and children especially.

Mr. Hughes stressed that everyone can contribute a donation to Canairielief to carry on this vital work and the Chapter answered with a donation. He was thanked by Mrs. Stan Wright who presented him with a small gift.

Bogus \$10 Bills Still Prevalent in the District

The past couple of weeks have seen a heavy influx of counterfeit Canadian currency into this area with bogus \$10 bills turning up in Georgetown, Milton and Acton.

If you come in possession of a counterfeit bill turn it over to the police office. Don't try to pass it. If you knowingly pass a bogus bill the punishment could be as much as 14 years in prison.

There are many ways of detecting a counterfeit bill. The most reliable is the planchettes

A planchette is a circular disc of paper, like confetti which is scattered at random into the pulp during the paper making process. Some settle within the paper and will not be visible on either side of the note. However if the note is held to a light, they will show up as dark discs in the paper. Planchettes on the surface can usually be picked off with a fingernail or pin.

Counterfeit planchettes are just ink of the same colour as genuine planchettes and cannot be picked off.

The bills that are presently in circulation are of good quality but they have defects and bad coloring in the area of the Queen's portrait. The sparkle dots are missing from her eyes.

The backs of these bills are very good, and are hard to tell from the real thing. If in doubt about a certain bill, compare it with a one dollar bill from your pocket, as one dollar bills are not counterfeited.

If you see somebody trying to pass a counterfeit bill call the police office and report it. Try to get the license number of the car and a good description of the passer. Above all, study 10 and 20 dollar bills so you can easily pick out a phoney. It's to your advantage, only you lose

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when you accept a counterfeit bill.

The serial No. of the bad bills discovered here is: R over E 3887435.
