Weather Ups and Downs But May Average

Last month was one of contrasts in every aspect of the weather record, but as is often the case, the totals and averages for the month turned out "normal".

Temperatures averaged 54.2 degrees, just 0.2 degrees below normal, but in the last week ranged from lows of 32 and 33 on the 26th and 27th to record daily highs of 87 and 90 on the 28th and 29th. Former records were 86 (1931 and 1941) and 88 (1929).

Rainfall was actually below the normal of 3.21 inches by almost half an inch, but two thirds of our total fell at the worst possible time, May 18, a holiday Sunday (1.62"). This was the heaviest one day rain-storm of this decade.

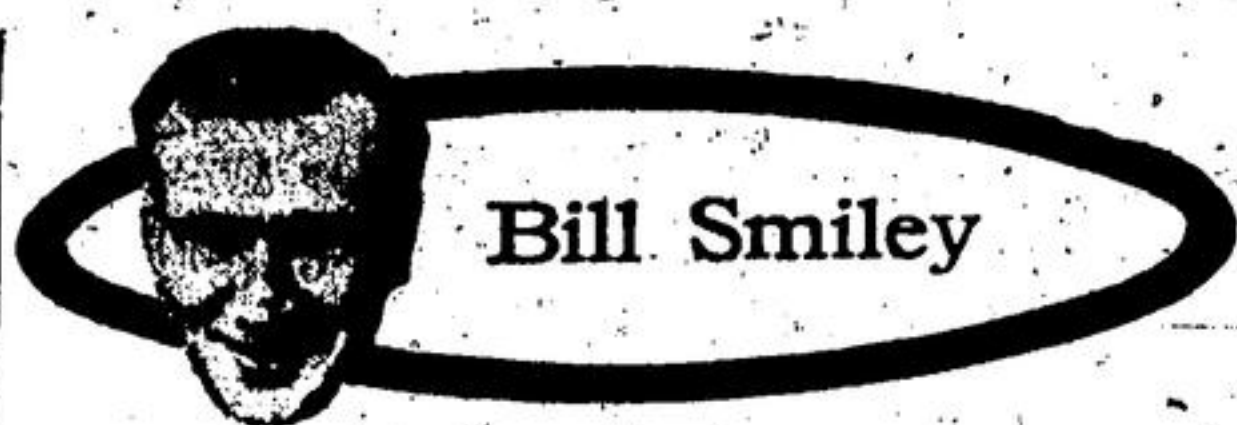
Rain also fell in small amounts on each day from the seventh to 14th. No snow was recorded this May. Sunshine hours were also within a few percent of normal at 253.5 which is 56.3 per cent of possible.

Second Collection Arranged for Oxfam

The Oxfam walk committee has arranged a second collection day to speed up the gathering of money earned in the May 3 Oxfam Walk through here. About half of the anticipated \$100,000 has been turned in.

Many were unable to get to the first collection day held Saturday, May 17 either because they were away on the holiday weekend, or because of the poor weather conditions. An Oxfam official said yesterday they also suspected that many of the walkers may not have had time to make their collections by the 17th.

The second collection day has been set for Thursday evening, June 12 at St. Paul's United Church, Brampton. Money may also still be taken to branches of the Royal Bank of Canada in Georgetown, Brampton and Brantford.
