

# Quality, Variety Abound at High School Art Show

The first student art show was held Thursday night in the high school auditorium, with roughly two hundred spectators out to view the exhibit.

The show was representative of the art program for Grades 9, 10, 11 and 12, and ranged from abstracts, landscapes, ink drawings, pencil drawings and sculpture. The welded sculpture

was done by the occupation class. Drawings of various houses in town attracted much interest as visitors tried to identify them. These were done during an outdoor sketching trip.

A few plaster of paris sculptures showed an 'Archer' influence while an oil painting by Rupert Bragg-Smith definitely had a

'Group of Seven' feeling. This may have resulted from a trip to the McMichael Conservation area, instigated by art department head Terry McDonald, who wanted to see the large collection of Canadian art housed there, including of course, the Group of Seven.

The heads both in plaster of paris and drawings, are part of the anatomy instruction. Here

students 'saw themselves' as others see them, since they were done from life, meaning another student, or from a photograph, so the instructor could see the comparison.

The purpose of the show, according to Mr. McDonald, was to let parents and other students who do not take art, see just what is being done in the art department.

## WITNESS INSTRUCTOR SAYS:

# "Bible is the Answer To Student Unrest"

"Student unrest and campus riots come as no surprise to those who are familiar with their Bible."

So says Mr. Frank Capes, instructor of the ministry development classes conducted weekly at the Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses located on No. 7 highway near Georgetown.

"These symptoms are one aspect of a growing feeling of frustration mixed with fear about the future that is engulfing the present generation," Mr. Capes commented, "and this was all foretold quite plainly in the family Bible."

As an example, Mr. Capes cited the Bible book of 2 Timothy: "But know this, that in the last days critical times hard to deal with will be here. For men will be disobedient to parents." He said that this would include today's general rebellion of the young against their elders which has resulted in the great increase in crime and violence in which the youth are involved.

What can be done about the situation? One thing is to get the public better informed as to the underlying causes of the difficulty, according to Mr. Capes.

"Where the reasons behind the trouble are appreciated youth rebellion is not a problem. Congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses do not experience a generation gap such as the one that forms the basis for the student revolt," he claimed, "and our students in the schools do not take part in such activity."

In our congregations the children are taught the respect for authority that is set out in the Bible. Once adults let young people down and challenge or question Divine authority it is not long until youths challenge parental, civil and other levels of authority. To aid their neighbors in understanding these matters the local congregation will share in a special mass distribution of the May 22nd issue of the magazine Awake! This issue asks the question, 'Why the worldwide student revolt?' and answers it from the Christian viewpoint," he said. "What students want, whether violence can be justified, plus what the young can look to for a happy future are some of the points covered by the special issue."

House-to-house distribution will continue until the entire area is covered or the supplies are exhausted, he said.

"Neither will this be a one-time effort to cope with the problem," Mr. Capes explained. "Throughout the summer months we will be aiding local families, including the youth, to study the Bible regularly in their homes at no cost. This

study will assist them to understand from the Bible why it is desirable to be law-abiding and will motivate them to be. We are, but we are working to change people through Bible education, so that they will make peace with God and with their fellow man.

The climax of the summer's educational campaign will be their 'Peace on Earth' International Assembly in Buffalo July 8-13 at War Memorial Stadium.

A native of Stoke-on-Trent, England, who emigrated to the States and later to Canada when she was a girl, Mrs. David Abner Boyd, 80, died in Georgetown hospital on May 20.

She lived in Cedar Rapids, Michigan, then at Hornby, where she was employed with the Theodore Brain family. Until she retired in 1965, she had been a member of the staff of the Exchange

Hotel for twenty years.
