Wellington Veto Means No Deer **Hunt in Halton**

A move by Wellington County has again killed Halton County plans for an open deer season.

Halton County Council approved the season early last week on the condition that Wellington and Wentworth counties also declare an open season.

Halton has now been informed Wellington County has vetoed the open season.

In 1968, plans to hold the hunt were also scrapped due to refusal by Wellington.

Tentatively scheduled to extend from Nov. 3-5, the season would have allowed hunters a no limit kill on deer, using only shotguns and no dogs.

At a May 5 meeting of the Halton County Agricultural Committee, an official of the department of lands and forests told members the department is not interested in having a deer season unless it can open three counties in a block.
