In 1968, plans to hold the hunt were also scrapped due to refusal by Wellington.

Tentatively scheduled to extend from Nov. 3-5, the season would have allowed hunters a no limit kill on deer, using only shotguns and no dogs.

At a May 5 meeting of the Halton County Agricultural Committee, an official of the department of lands and forests told members the department is not interested in having a deer season unless it can open three counties in a block.
