

# Banquet Marks Last Graduating Class at Chapel Street School

The 100th and the last Chapel Street school Grade 8 banquet was held last Thursday night in the Legion Hall.

In September Chapel will become a junior school, with senior pupils shifted to other schools.

It was a nostalgic occasion with former Chapel Street student, well known hockey great, Bob Goldham, the guest speaker.

He reminisced with Mayor "Steamer" Emmerson and recalled the town with 2,500 population, and one public and one high school. "I didn't even

know the school was called "Chapel Street," he commented "since it was only "the school" when I was there. There only was the one school."

He mentioned teachers he remembered, and a piece of a tooth, he left in the playground of Chapel Street school. Particularly he stressed his pride in being a Canadian and a Georgetownner.

"Growing up in Georgetown, is one of the nicest things that could happen," said the ex-hockey star. "You can walk to the arena, to the ball field, and the swimming pool."

He credited the influence of his father and Gordon Alcott for his success in hockey. "With out their encouragement, I wouldn't have made it in the NHL," he stated.

He concluded with some exchange of banter with the mayor, with whom he went to school.

The chairman for the evening John Tost, introduced the head table, consisting of E. S. Lander, Assistant Superintendent of the North Halton Education Centre, D. Magwood, grade 8 teacher, Fred Armitage, chairman of the Halton County Board of Education, Mayor Emmerson, Val Stein, principal Chapel Street school and Guy Korzack.

Guy Korzack introduced the guest speaker, Bob Goldham, listing his hockey career in Maple Leafs, Black Hawks, and finally Detroit Red Wings, and now his new career as video tape analyst for Hockey Night in Canada.

Fred Armitage, chairman of the Halton County Board of Education admitted some of the southern members had known little about the county as a whole, and had tended to be smug about education in the south. "But now we find the education in the north has been of a high calibre, with many things we did not have in the southern end." He praised John Tost, the master of ceremonies for his poise and ease, suggesting he could use him at some of the "tougher" meetings of the Board for support.

Both the mayor and E.S. Lander joined in this opinion, seeing him as a future politician.

Entertainment was provided by members of the graduating class, with a song by Connie Allan, accordion solos by Pat Ellison and Debbie Norton, guitar solo by Gord Hunter, and a baton-twirling exhibition by Cathy Danylichuk. Cathy is Miss Brampton-Bramalea and Miss Hamilton baton twirler, and has won many trophies. She will be featured in Edmonton's Klondike Days and the Calgary Stampede.

The toast to the Queen was given by C. Ileen O'Connor, "O Canada" played by Julie Goebel, grace by Yvonne Lorusso and the thanks to the speaker by Debbie Jarvie.
