PC's Want Watchdog Group to Police Ontario School Budgets

The Halton County Progressive Conservative Association have petitioned Education Minister William Davis to set up a special watchdog committee to police public spending by Ontario trustees.

The Halton Tories sent their petition to Davis in the form of a motion through Halton East MPP James Snow of R R 2, Georgetown.

Action by the PCs to have Davis set up budget review boards comes as a result of the stiff protest over education cost in Halton.

Halton regional education board recently presented a \$32,000,000 budget.

In a brief submitted to the Hon. Charles McNaughton, Ontario Treasurer and to Davis this week, the Halton East PC's suggest that such a board should include experienced cost accountants who would be independent of the boards of education whose budget it would review.

The budgets of all the boards

would be carefully scrutinized prior to approval.

"Such approval would be necessary before the boards could receive funds from the municipalities," said John Kilmer, president of the association.

The association also urged the Ontario Government to implement its plans as announced recently by Mr. McNaughton, to increase education grants to cover 60 per cent of the costs of elementary and secondary education. At present, Ontario pays approximately 45 per cent of these costs with the balance coming from property assessment within the jurisdiction of the local Boards of Education.

McNaughton indicated in his budget speech this spring that the province is prepared to set up budget review boards if ed-

ucation costs "are not kept in line and if trustees do not pay attention to public demands that school costs be kept down."
