A total of 375 dogs and 125 cats were inoculated with anti-rabies serum at the free, rabies clinic held Wednesday in the municipal garage on Maple Ave. East.

Three veterinarians, and one student, administered the shots. Dr. B.C. Buckrell of town, Dr. W.J. McCabe and Dr. J. Apse of Brampton, and James Howell of the Veterinary College.
