Ed Blair became Chinguacousy Township's reeve Thursday immediately following the stepping down of Reeve Cyril Clark who had served the municipality for 17 years, 15 of those as reeve.

Blair was voted unanimously into the township's top post by his colleagues on council.

The new deputy reeve, also named unanimously, is former councillor Bob Williams.

The departure of Reeve Cyril Clark is the end of an era for the township which has grown from a community of 3,000 to almost 30,000 in the 17 years in which he served.

Gives Inspiring Address At Cemetery Memorial Day

Hillcrest Cemetery Memorial Service was well attended on Sunday afternoon June 22. Julian Reed was master of ceremonies and Canon James E. Maxwell of Hornby, the guest speaker. Canon Maxwell gave an inspiring address. He took as his text, "And this commandment have we from Him, that he who loveth God love his brother also." He pointed out that today the church in its pilgrimage through time to Eternity had entered upon a new and strange land. The old world that we knew, and in which we had been raised, the world known as Christendom, had come to an end. The church today was well into the secular era, in which it was no longer easy to be a Christian. "No longer do men acknowledge the supremacy of Christ in the world," he said, "but sometimes we find hostility, and in some quarters Christians are ridiculed." Canon Maxwell went on to point out that for the most part the world seems to be indifferent to the Christian gospel.

Under such circumstances, we must remember that we are men and women of faith, and we must do more than preach, we must demonstrate our faith. The world is disappointed in us because we have not been faithful to the ideals and the purposes of our religion as our fathers were. We have failed to provide for our children the same Christian instruction that we received. There is a terrifying silence about God in our homes, family prayers and daily Bible readings are sadly neglected. The world has advanced in every area, science, education, politics etc. but in religion we seem to be standing still, we are not deepening our understanding of prayer or our awareness of God. The world looks to us for guidance and is disappointed, not in the Christian gospel, but in our presentation of it. Canon Maxwell further pointed out that in actual fact, Christians are in the forefront of almost every worthwhile endeavor, but hesitate to publicly admit their Christianity. It used to be that to call a man a 'Christian' was about the highest honour you could pay him, but today we seem to be embarrassed about admitting our membership in the Christian Church. As a consequence, the world wonders what the church is doing in the way of social service and works of charity. The truth is, that through her membership, the church is actively engaged in promoting human welfare, but the secular world is not always aware of it because men hesitate to say "I do this because I am a Christian."

During the service selections were played on the organ by Mr. Bernard Shrubsole who also played for the hymns. James Fiddler sounded the 'Last Post' and Reveille, and Hyatt McClure thanked those who took part in the service.

The cemetery was well cared for and showed the work of the board and the caretaker. Many families had placed flowers on the graves of loved ones for the service. Following the service many enjoyed visiting with friends from a distance, renewing old acquaintances, and a quiet walk around the cemetery.
