**Mosquitoes Win 5-0 In Ontario Cup Round**

**CLERGY COMMENT**

**Close The Churches?**

In our present society we hear the faint murmurings of some who are opposed to the Church. These vibrations are small in regard to the overwhelming sound of those who still regard the Church as a needed and necessary part of our Canadian life and its social structure. Yet any complaint must be considered with appropriate steps taken to correct the ill if possible.

The undercurrent, as we think of it, against the Church may be not be so much against the organization itself or even the need of church in one's life but probably more so against the role it is trying to play.

The former transport minister, Mr. Paul Hellyer, during a recent speech questioned the role of Churches today in a world torn by conflicts and ideological struggles. "A generation ago," he said, "the church was the centre of social activity in the community. This function is largely changed through competition supplied by service groups, social clubs and television." He went on to say, "One wonders if perhaps service clubs are now doing better work than churches."

If we are to suppose, as from this statement, that Churches are in competition with service clubs then I for one will concede that they are doing a better job and that the churches ought to be closed. Unfortunately too many churches have adopted a social role and have forgotten or at least have neglected the primary purpose for their existence. The commission that Jesus gave to His followers was to go and make disciples of all peoples. Not that we are to ignore the needs physically or socially of anybody; but God's supreme desire is to bring men and women and young folk to the place of repentance and faith. This He made possible through the Supreme Sacrifice of His Son, Jesus Christ.

In an effort to satisfy the natural cravings of men for fleshly satisfaction the Church of God has neglected men's spiritual needs to the extent that even the prosperous and apparently happy of Canada (including Georgetown) have openly disregarded God. Man "worships" himself and Sunday has become a "fun day."

Close the Church? Not at all! However, let us see our role in its right perspective. Give the Gospel of Salvation priority and God may wish to vindicate our existence by a revival throughout our wonderful land. Should we fail to follow God's Word we will undoubtedly see the downfall of anything that resembles religious life. "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." Proverbs 14:12.
