# High Paid School Officials Draw Halton Council Ire

Halton County council last Thursday again added its protest to the storm over the county education board's record \$32 million budget with at least two members condemning the excess of highly-paid officials in the county school administration.

Nassagaweya Deputy Reeve Mrs. Anne MacArthur told council:

"It's nothing short of ridiculous the number of bureaucrats at the top who in my opinion are unnecessary."

Oakville Deputy Reeve William Gillies agreed the county education administration "has far more executive staff than they need."

"We should make an issue of this" Gillies said. "They should be publicly made to state their needs because it's public funds they're spending."

Unnecessary Salaries

Deputy Reeve MacArthur suggested one way to cut down on the 1969 record budget, which has been condemned by ratepayers across the county, would be to cut down on the number of high and unnecessary salaries.

Halton Education Director James W. Singleton is the highest paid with an annual salary of \$31,000 making him the highest paid public official in the county.

Below Singleton is Assistant Director D. S. Lawless, and then come the superintendents, co-ordinators, assistants, consultants and an entire staff to look after the business and finance of county school administration.

Mrs. MacArthur told council it should ask again Education Minister William Davis why Halton County needs so many highly-paid administrators.

Burlington Reeve Gordon Gallagher said the county education board should be completely responsible for raising its own money, subject to approval by the Ontario Municipal Board, in the same way municipal councils are.

He criticized the current system and said there will be no answer to the problem until it is changed.

Deputy Reeve Gillies charged the regional school board with being "irresponsible" with its current budget.

He said there seems to be nothing the thousands of protesting ratepayers can do about the school budget.

# Rabies Disease Continues Vaccination Best Solution

The Interdepartmental Committee on Rabies recommends that all persons in Ontario be reminded of the continuing problem of rabies infection in wild and domestic animals in the Province.

It is of particular importance at this time of the year to bring this matter to the attention of those persons who will be vacationing in the resort areas and visiting the Provincial Parks where the opportunity to contact wild animals is greatly increased.

Should anyone be bitten or scratched by a wild animal, or a domestic animal which is behaving abnormally, a physician should be consulted as soon as possible to determine whether or not there is any possibility of rabies infection, and the Medical Officer of Health for the district in which you are located should be notified. The Ontario Department of Health provides rabies vaccine and serum, free of charge, for use by physicians for the treatment of persons exposed to possible rabies infection.

Further information and assistance may be obtained from staff members of the Department of Lands and Forests, the Department of Agriculture and Food, or the local Department of Health.
