

Church Funeral for Victim of Accident

Interment in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown, followed the funeral service in St. John's Anglican Church, Stewarttown on June 25 for Gary Thomas Briggs, 21.

Gary was instantly killed in a motor accident on Highway 7 the previous Sunday.

Son of Howard and Eida Briggs, who have just moved to Ballinacraig from Stewarttown, he was employed with his father in the upholstering business and had worked at Northern Electric before that.

Born in Brampton, he lived there and in Toronto before moving to Stewarttown where

he attended public school and later high school in Georgetown. He sang in the choir and was sidesman in St. John's church, and played hockey with Georgetown teams.

He leaves his wife, the former Marcia LeBlanc whom he married last year and a baby son Brian Thomas; his parents and two sisters, Alice and Phyllis.

Canon James Maxwell conducted the funeral service and pallbearers were Ron Cash, Bill Kavanagh, Paul LeBlanc of Brampton, Bill Toth, Acton, Kirk Parker, Orton and Louis Kosmerley, Cooksville.

Happy Ending When Tina's Capture Ends 5 Day Hunt

Just like Lassie — Tina came home.

Tina is a seven months old collie which belongs to Mrs. Gail Williamson of 15 Confederation Street, Glen Williams. For five days, from Thursday, June 19 through Tuesday, June 24 she was the object of an extensive search through Georgetown's gullies and wooded areas which ended when Gillon Ford and Jimmie Baillie finally coaxed and caught her and took her to the Georgetown Animal Clinic.

Her capture ended a hunt that involved Dr. Brian Buckrell of the Georgetown Animal Clinic, Mr. and Mrs. Running of RunWry Kennels, Mrs. Georgina Jaffray of Brampton, Mr. and Mrs. D. Atkins of Glen Williams, Janice and Bill Baillie of Glen Williams, Alf Goodwin of Georgetown, Jimmy Baillie and Gillon Ford, and several unknown adults and school children.

While all the commotion was going on, Mrs. Williamson and

her husband David were in England attending a family wedding.

"We were very impressed with all the concern, and excitement, and very happy at Tina's well being when we arrived home on Wednesday, (June 25), Mrs. Williamson told the Herald.

"My husband and I and our two children (Kelvin and Christine) feel so very indebted and grateful to so many people having such concern for our dog," she said.

Gai-Tina of Lyndale, as she is registered, took to the streets while the Williamson car was parked outside the Animal Clinic on Guelph St., where she and her mother "Princess" were to be boarded while the Williamsons were overseas.

Pushing open a car window and jumping out she became panic stricken by the traffic and darted across the highway at Maple Avenue just missing

by inches being struck by a car.

Mr. and Mrs. Williamson searched for five and a half hours before leaving to catch their flight. Before they left they informed the police dog catcher, Dr. Buckrell, radio station CHIC and neighbours.

During the searching which took place during the next few days Tina was spotted a few times in the gully near the high school, but would always turn and run the opposite way when called.

Many people scoured the likely hiding places daily until dark, their concern intensified by the steady rain.

On Tuesday, June 24, Dr. Buckrell said he was doubtful of Tina's condition due to fear and hunger even though Alf Goodwin had made a point of placing food around the areas where it was presumed Tina was hiding.

At quarter past seven p.m. that same day Tina's wandering ended when the boys patiently coaxed her into their arms and delivered her to the clinic.
