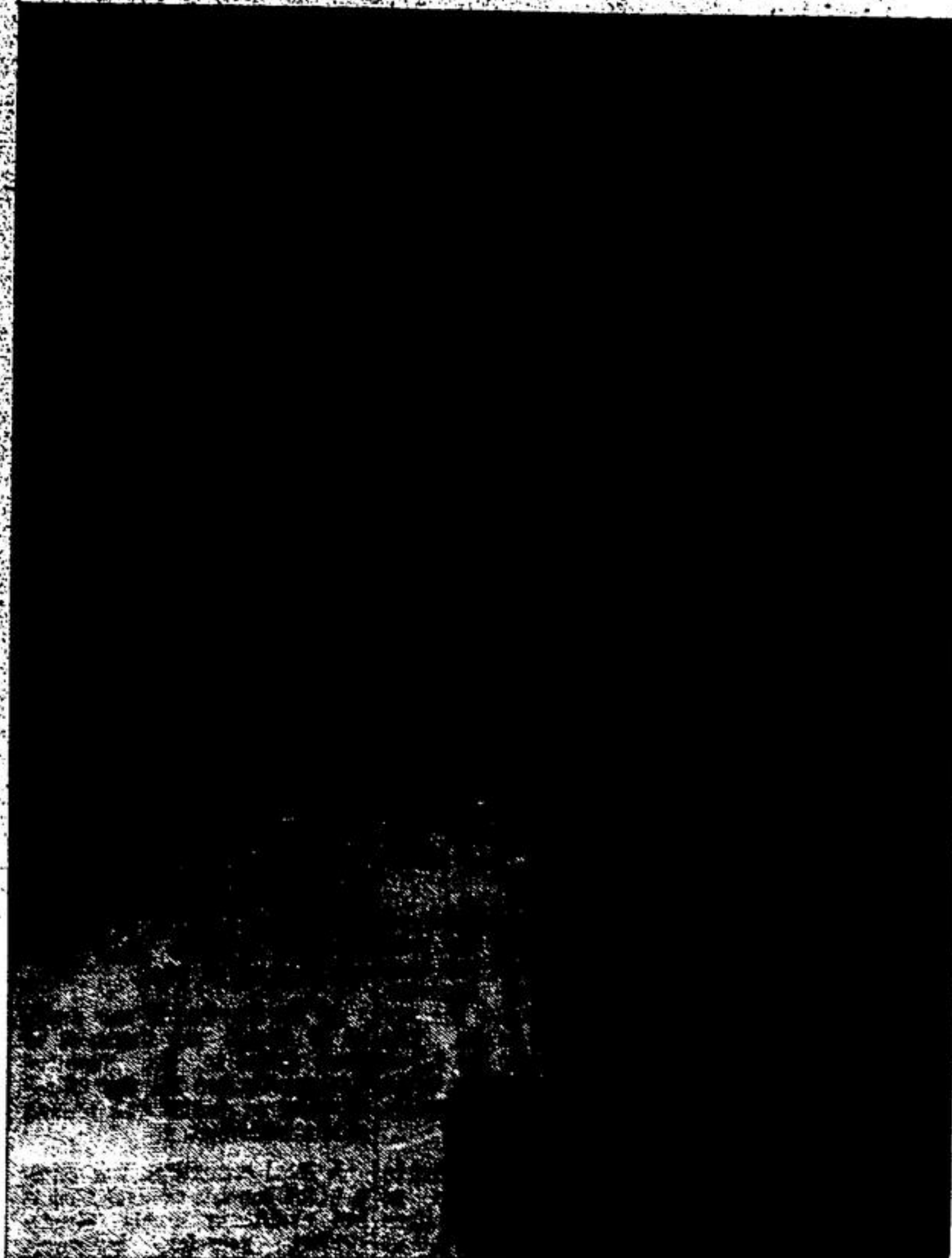


European Honeymoon Then Enters Dentistry
