Mostly Minor Damage In Week's Accidents

The police accident report for the week showed a Main and Maple Ave. collision Monday morning, July 14, to be the most expensive with damages totalling \$500.

The four other accidents of the week were of a minor nature, with a slightly dented front fender on a '66 Beaumont driven by John Peddle, Riverview Cres., being the sole damage to that car, in a minor collision with a '65 Buick driven by Frank L. Stewart of Guelph. \$85 damage was done to the Buick. The Peddle car was turning on to Main Street from Ewing while the Stewart car was proceeding south on Main Street.

Friday, July 11th another small accident occurred on Main Street North, when a parked car owned by Dale M. Casselman of R. R. 4 Georgetown was slightly damaged when Mary E. Lunn also of

R. R. 4 pulled in too close while attempting to park. The Lunn car suffered \$35 damages and the Casselman car only \$5.

A one car accident happened Sunday night about 11 o'clock when a car parked in Cedarvale Community Centre parking lot rolled down into a clump of trees. \$90 damage was done to the car owned by Dix M. Simpson, 101 Rexway Drive.

Cars belonging to two residents of the same apartment building at 82 Main St. South were very slightly damaged when a '68 Chev driven by Frank Mullin backed into a parked '69 Volkswagen owned by Michael Haynes. \$20 damage was done to the Haynes car parked in front of the apartment building, while the Mullin car, attempting to park, suffered no damage.

Campaign for Cheaper Water, Seeks Support

Dear Mr. Editor:

I would appreciate you publishing this in a prominent spot in your next issue.

As a one-time president of the Georgetown Ratepayers Association, together with a few other ardent and willing citizens, made many endeavours to assist the people of this town to achieve fair treatment as far as possible with the power we had, to see that our then-noble councillors did not pass legislation which was for ever affecting our pocket book.

For instance, the great battle we fought, and won, as many of you older residents remember was the question of a demand by our worthy Cr. Powers, now long gone, who at that time faced with a large deficit was only too eager to solve his problem, by a sudden increase in the price of water.

Now I am not suggesting water in this town is an expensive commodity, but at the same time, the cost of producing water to the consumer need not be if it is handled by competent people who know the cheapest way to produce, and the fairest means of selling it to the consumer.

We all must have water, we know, and it is a known fact that with the number of wells in Georgetown there is ample supplies to cover everybody's needs. But why should the man or woman using only a pail of water a day pay the same as the man using 100 gallons a day in some venture on which he is obviously making money.

On the other hand we also know the present water commission at present will tell you there is a scale of increased rates for those who use excessive quantities over and above the minimum allowed, but we have already had our original quantity reduced from 6,000 gallons to 5,000 gallons, and are now asked to pay more for those 5,000 gallons than we did for the 6,000 gallons plus 50 per cent sewage.

I know this can be improved upon giving everyone from the smallest user of water a benefit in the cost of their water supply but one man cannot fight alone, in order to serve the interests of the majority.

Your support is urgently required, in order to stop the ever-increasing cost of living—therefore please either write me giving the average two months consumption, or phone me at 877-9404 — (a postcard or letter either mailed or dropped in my door) will be helping me to help you.

Always remember unity is strength — Together we stand — divided we fall.
