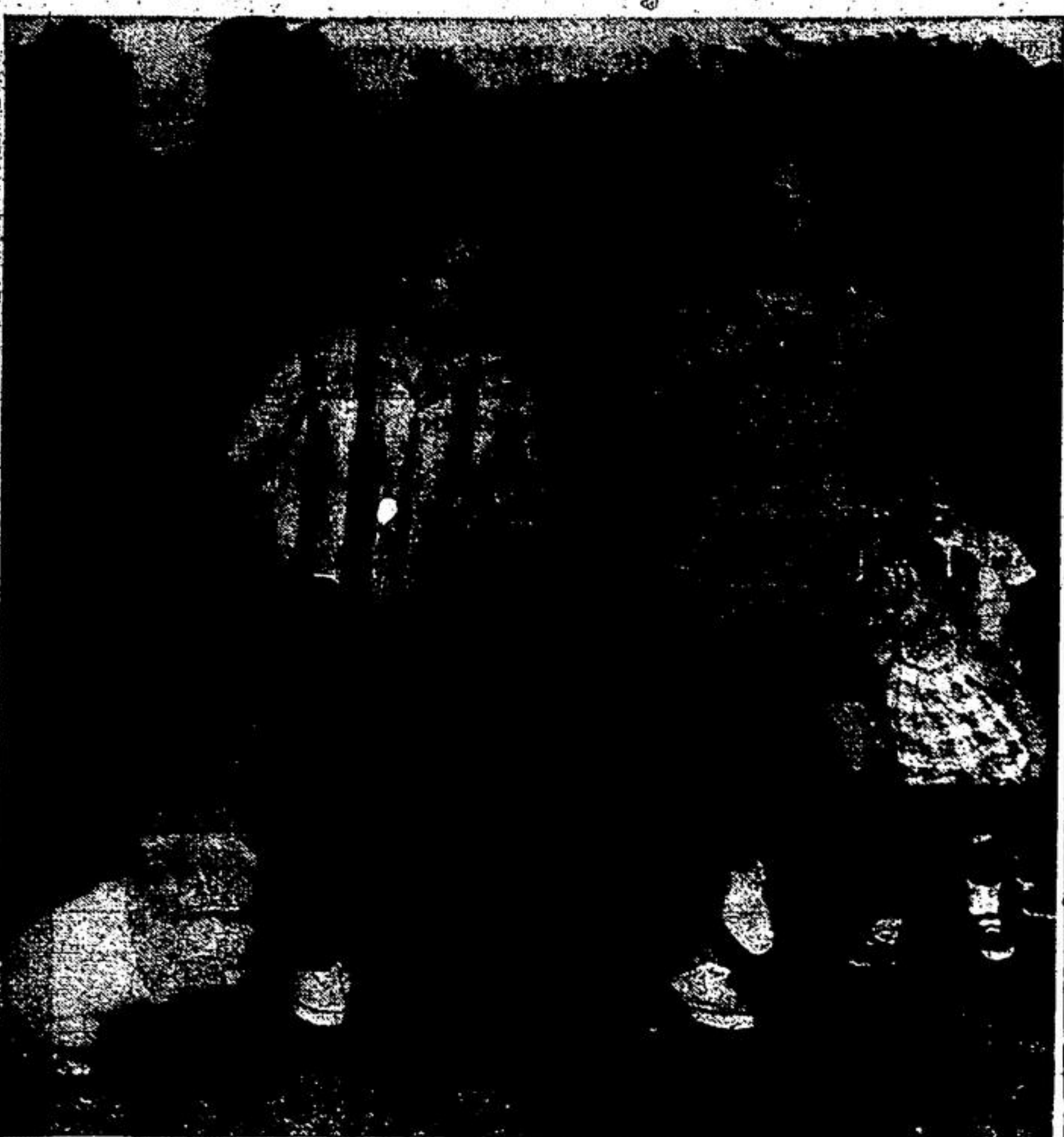


## Early Morning Jogging Neighbourly 'Keep Fit'

## Powder Puff Entrant Flies Across The States

A Limehouse mother of two, Mrs. Barbara Brotherton this week completed the 23rd annual transcontinental powder puff derby air race. Mr. and Mrs. Brotherton and their two sons live on the sixth line of Esqueja, south of Limehouse.

She's a former high school teacher who has been flying for 10 years and has accumulated 450 hours in the air.

Partnered with Mrs. Brotherton in the race was Mrs. Ruth Bliss, a New Jersey grandmother with 2,100 flying hours behind her.

The three day race began at San Diego, California, and ended at Dulles International airport in Washington. There were 92 light planes which started the race, all with women as pilots, and 59 planes completed the race.

Most of the contestants planned to go on to New York after the race for the annual convention of the Ninety-Nines, an organization of women pilots. The only other Canadian entry came from Calgary.

The winners will be determined after the judges have compared handicaps with elapsed flying time. Mrs. Brotherton's sons attend Georgetown District High School.
