Shattered Idealism

A tragic incident last week in which a young woman, passenger in a car driven by Senator Edward Kennedy, was drowned, is enough to mar the career of a poli-

But when the politician is an aspiring presidential candidate, member of a family which has contributed one president, and one might-have-been president, who both died by assassins' bullets, it becomes a matter of grave concern, not only to the States but to the world.

According to Kennedy's story, he repeatedly dived in an attempt to free the victim from the car. He then returned to a party, told his two cousins who returned with him to the scene and also attempted a rescue. Buf it was not until the next morning, eight or nine hours later, that any of them contacted the police.

Convicted of leaving and not reporting an accident, the story became more bizarre when Kennedy took television time to tell his story, and asked Massachusetts voters

to contact him to help him make up his mind on whether he should continue


