 It will be the end of an era in Peterborough, Ontario on August 1 when John Danko, Sports Director at CHEX Radio and TV for the past 14 years, leaves to take on a new position. Danko will succeed Doug Miller as Executive Director of the Bowling Proprietors' Association of Ontario, working out of Toronto, has been with the Bowling Proprietors' Association for seven years and in that time has established "Bowling Programs second to none."

 In succeeding Miller, Danko takes over for a person who was also raised in Peterborough and who, at one time, was a star in that city's favourite sport, lacrosse. Miller moves into an executive position with Seaway Multi-Corporation in Toronto.

Branch 120 will host the first dinner meeting on Monday, September 8. Executive and directors will formulate plans for the future. Invitations will be extended to members of the news media.

Campbellville will be Giants opposition in Georgetown park Wednesday, August 6.

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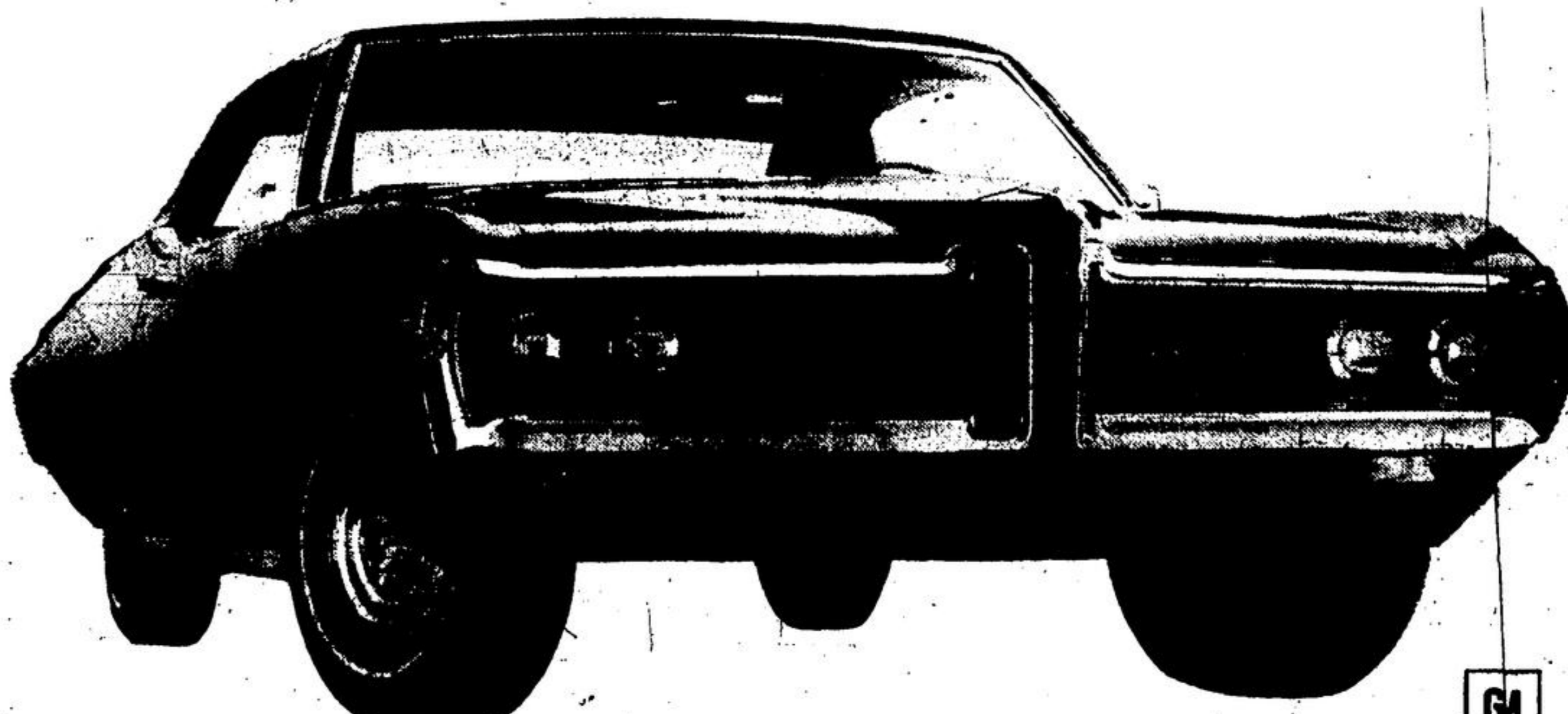
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
