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CANADIAN RADIO-TELEVISION COMMISSION

The Canadian Radio Television Commission heard applications for licences to carry on CATV broadcasting undertakings and the Commission announces the following decisions:

As a matter of policy, the Commission's approval of applications to carry on CATV broadcasting undertakings is for a period of two years. Licensing conditions will be based upon the Commission's CATV policy which was announced on May 13, 1969.

It is a condition of each licence that the licensee company shall comply on or before September 1, 1970, with the direction of His Excellency, the Governor-General-in-Council, regarding ownership and control (SOR 69-140).

DECISION CRTC 69-209 GEORGETOWN, ONT.

Application for a licence by Georgetown Cable TV limited to carry on a CATV broadcasting undertaking.

DECISION: The Commission grants a licence for a two-year period, subject to conditions which will be specified in the licence, to serve the area described as follows:

From the intersection of the western corporate limits of Georgetown and Highway 7 northeasterly along the corporate limits of Georgetown (east side) to the intersection of the corporate limits of Georgetown and the Canadian National Railway tracks, then northerly along the Canadian National Railway tracks (east side) to the intersection of the Canadian National Railway tracks and Esquesing Concession Road 9, then easterly by a direct line (south side) to the intersection of Esquesing Concession Road 10 and Halton County Road 13, then southeasterly along Esquesing Concession Road 10 (south side) to intersection of Esquesing Concession Road 10 and Halton County Road 23, then southeasterly along Halton County Road 23 (west side) to intersection of Halton County Road 23 and Credit River, then southeasterly along Credit River (south side) and corporate limits of Georgetown (south side) to intersection of corporate limits of Georgetown and Highway 7, then northeasterly by a direct line (south side) to Halton County Road 13, then southeasterly by a direct line (west side) to the intersection of Halton County Roads 8 and 10, then westerly along Halton County Road 10 (north side), to intersection of Halton County Road 10 and Esquesing Concession Road 9, then northwesterly along Esquesing Concession Road 9 (east side) to corporate limits of Georgetown, then northwesterly along corporate limits of Georgetown (east side) to the intersection of the corporate limits of Georgetown and Highway 7.
