Arbic Represents Giants In County All-Star Game

One thing about the 1969 Halton County League All-Star team - it should score plenty of runs.

The 1969 team, selected by the league's nine managers, has a composite batting average of .385.

Included on the team are five Leaside Maple Leafs, two Oakville Oaks, two Burlington Cardinals, one Waterdown Tiger and one Campbellville Merchant.

The All-Stars will play the semi-professional Chicago Orioles at Oakville Park, Sunday.

This is the second year in a row Leaside has dominated the starting team. Catcher B. Reed, second baseman Robbie Stevens, shortstop Alf Payne, outfielder Bob Sullivan and pitcher Bob Johnstone are the Maple Leaf starters.

Pitcher Kenny Symons and outfielder Paul Pallidor represent Burlington pitcher Neil Dodman of Waterdown and third baseman Kenny Moore of Campbellville round out the team.

Three 400 hitters failed to make the starting team in what is obviously a hitter's year. The trio are catcher Alex Lockington of Waterdown and shortstops Larry Wilson of Dundas and Danny Arbic of Georgetown.

Arbic is the league's leading pitcher. Manager Joe Irvine of the league-leading Leaside Maple Leafs qualifies automatically as All-Star manager.

His coaches are Mac Twiss of Waterdown, Earl Cairns of Campbellville and Gary Jeffrie of Burlington.

An additional 11 players will be named as alternates. That list will include three pitchers, two catchers, two infielders, two outfielders, and two utilitymen.

Bob Salvibus, last year's batting champion, was an alternate last year. He has a .415 batting average.

Selection to the team caps an impressive comeback by Charlie McFeeters, who sat out the 1968 season with a hockey injury.

The fleet blond outfielder struggled to regain his batting eye early this season as his average slipped to .130 at one point. But he's been hitting steadily since mid-June and had a .344 average at last count.

Reed was all-star first baseman despite a puny .235 average last year. He became Leaside's catcher when Jim Wilson shifted to the Galt Terriers of the Senior Intercounty.

He seems to have thrived on the change. His latest average is .391 and he's been impressive defensively despite his bulk.

Both Stevens (.439) and Payne (.419) are former professionals. Veteran followers of the league agree the Leaside duo ranks with the best double play combinations in league history.

Stevens was an all-star last year. Despite his greying hair and spectacles, Moore has been regarded for many years as one of the most consistent hitters in the league.

He is still one of the best base-runners in the league and leads the reorganized Campbellville club with a .362 average. He's more at home in the outfield, but has done a first-class defensive job at third base.

Sullivan, a second year man in the league, packs unusual power for a little man and has a .352 average. Pallidor, a rookie is hitting .348.

Johnstone is generally regarded as the toughest pitcher in the league. He's won five of six decisions and has a sparkling 0.93 ERA. He's another former pro.

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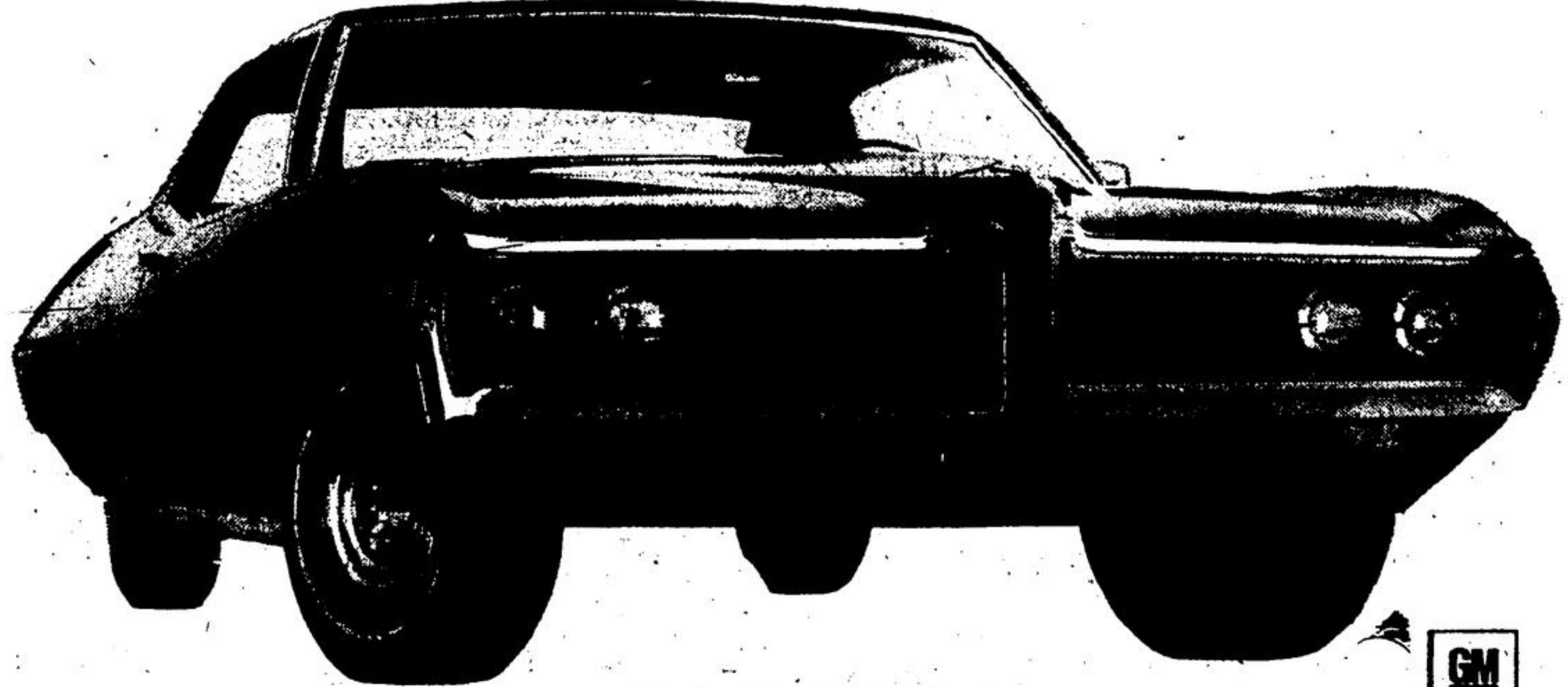
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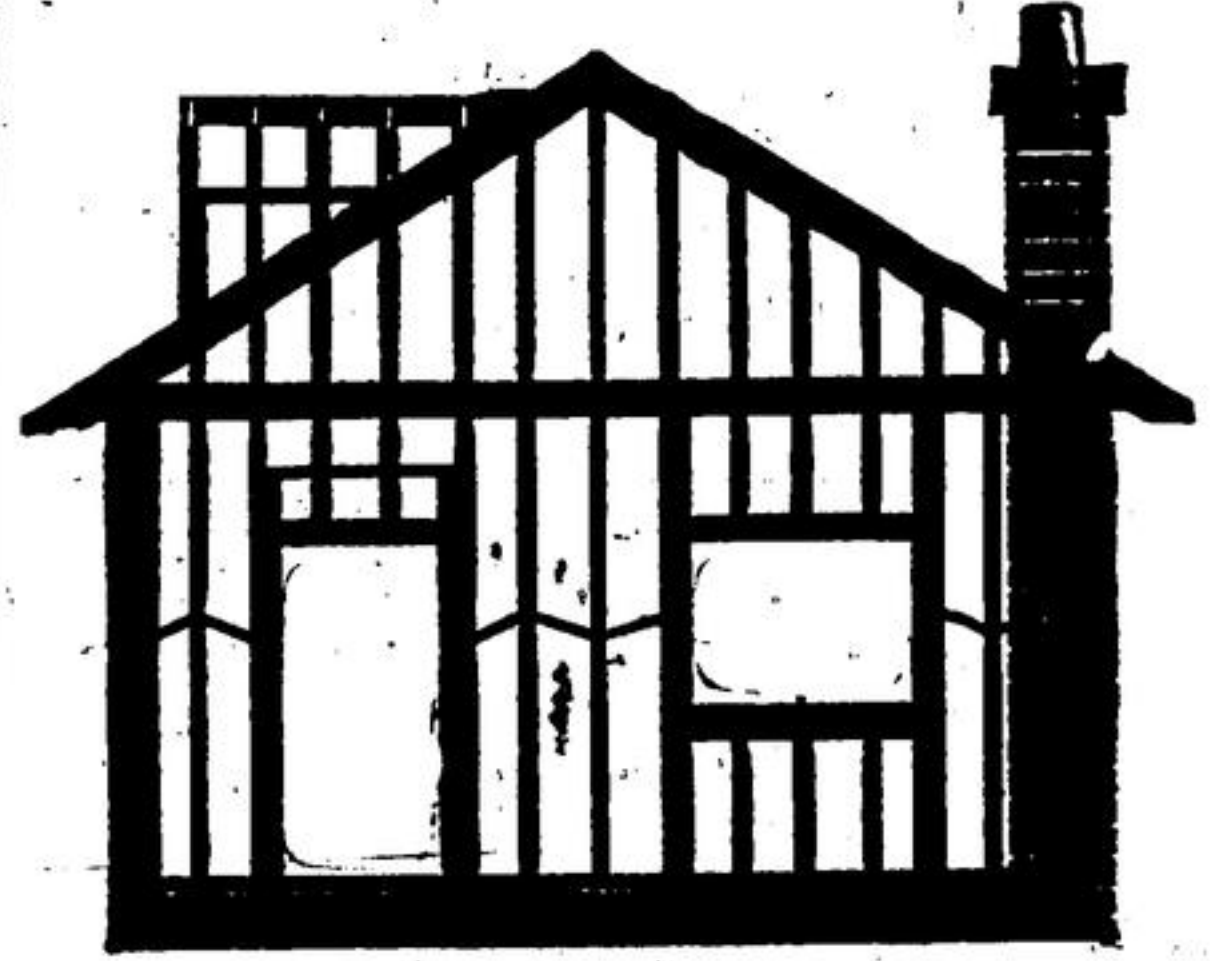
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
