

Diamond Replicas Drew Attention in Display



Only John Boughton can tell, with this powerful microscope as he examines replicas of famous jewels which appeared in his store window last week.

A priceless array of diamonds has been on display in Boughton Jewellers' store window for the last two weeks. Such world famous names in diamonds as Koh-i-Noor, Jubilee, Great Mogul and Hope nestled there in little purple velvet boxes for all to see and wonder.

Luckily for owner John Boughton's peace of mind they were all replica or 'paste' as they say in mystery movies. It was all part of a travelling exhibit, sponsored by diamond merchants and available to their retail customers.

Incredible tales of murder, intrigue and mystery accompany those diamonds of priceless value. "The Great Mogul and the Jubilee" at 280 and 245 carats respectively were the two biggest diamonds on show.

Probably the best known diamond, the Koh-i-Noor, dates back to 1304, where it was traced to an Indian Rajah. After various schemes and murders it found its way to East India Company as payment of a debt. They in turn presented it to Queen Victoria in 1850 to mark the 250th anniversary of the East India Company. It now belongs to the Queen Mother, and is housed with the Crown Jewels in the Tower of London when not in use. Koh-i-Noor means: Mountain of Light.

The Hope diamond, known even to those who never saw a diamond, held first place in the inventory of the French Crown Jewels until a robbery in 1792, where many of the French Crown Jewels were dispersed forever.

Henry Philip Hope bought it in 1830 for \$90,000. A grandson Lord Hope married an American actress Mary Yohé and gave it to her. However, in 1906 he had to sell it to cover his debts. After several changes of ownership, including a Turkish Sultan it was bought by Mrs. Evelyn Walsh McLean who wore it, rather than stored it.

Upon her death it was bought by New York diamond merchant Harry Winston, who presented it to the Smithsonian Institute.

Each of the stones has a long story, and could make a magnificent plot for a mystery to end all mysteries.

Hoey Second-Death in County Council Ranks

A private funeral just for members of the family was held in Guelph Thursday for Nassagaweya Township Reeve William Hoey who died of a heart attack while holidaying in Digby, Nova Scotia, with his wife and daughter.

McIntyre and Wilkie Funeral Home of Guelph handled the arrangements. Burial was in Rockwood Cemetery.

Hoey, 54, chairman of the county board of health and a member of the roads committee and finance, welfare and assessment committees, was elected reeve of the north Halton township at the beginning of this year. Prior to that he was deputy-reeve for three years.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth, two daughters, Judith Carolyn, and Martha Jane, and a brother Russell Hoey of Tampa, Florida.

Reeve Hoey's sudden death is the second this year among county councillors. Mr. E. Burke, deputy reeve of Burlington, died in January. Her position has been taken by W. A. Reeve of rural Milton.

Nassagaweya Township council will meet this week to consider a successor for Reeve Hoey.

The township has the alternative of selecting a new reeve from the current membership of council, giving the position to Nassagaweya deputy reeve Anne MacArthur, or appointing an outsider.

The township, like the other six municipalities in Halton County, is represented on county council by the reeve and deputy reeve.

Next meeting of county council is August 26.
