Urges Petition for Retaining of Busses

Dear Sir:

On Thursday, August 28, The Halton County Board of Education will meet in Oakville, regarding the termination of school buses to high schools within 3 mile radius of each school.

Mr. E. Bodnar, our local representative to the board has confirmed this in our recent conversation, and indicated that this move will likely be accepted. Mr. Bodnar suggested he will ask the board to consider a staging program in areas where sidewalks and streets are in undeveloped state, contending that walking on the open road would prove dangerous, and result in undue hardship to the student.

I would like to appeal to all parents who would be affected by this move this year and in years to come. It is commendable that the Board wishes to save money for the taxpayer but in view of recent reports on the spending of various school boards, pay increases to members of the board and consideration to special groups of students regarding transportation to other schools at the taxpayers expense, I am sure, that depriving our children of a ride to their school on a school bus, and expecting parents to make own arrangements or let the children walk up to 3 miles through rain and snow, will not meet with the approval of those families concerned.

I strongly recommend a petition to be signed and circulated by all in disagreement with this move, and if at all possible, those that can make time on August 28 at 8 p.m. be present at the school board meeting in Oakville to personally express their protest.
