

## Mary Anderson Highest Land Judging Score

On Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 8 the Halton Land Judging Competition was held for Halton 4-H club members. A total of 33 members met at the Fairgrounds, Milton, and proceeded on a road tour of north Burlington. Stops were made along the road in six locations to look at the top three feet of soil along the roadside.

The 4-H members were coached on the different types of soil and the crops that would grow best at each location. Coaches were C.H. Kingsbury and Bob Roy, Soils and Crops Branch; Jack James and Henry Stanley from the Agricultural office.

Then everyone went to the farm of Brock Harris and took part in the competition — placing four land areas and deciding their suitability to grow alfalfa, barley, corn and apples. Reasons were given by each contestant.

The competition finished with a picnic supper of chicken at Rattlesnake Point. The prize money for this competition and the supper were provided by the Halton Region Conservation Authority.

### O.P.P. REPORT

Officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at Milton detachment worked a total of 235½ hours and patrolled 22,040 miles on area roads during the week of August 3 to 9. Charges were laid against 82 motorists for contraventions of various sections of the ITA and 37 others received warnings for minor offences.

General occurrences requiring investigation numbered 48 this week, including 6 thefts, 3 disturbances, 2 complaints of dogs biting children, 3 investigations under the Liquor Control Act resulting in 13 persons being summoned for court appearance. There were 3 complaints regarding trespassers, 1 domestic complaint, 1 assault, 1 missing person complaint was investigated, 1 report of malicious damage was checked, 1 death was investigated and 1 premise found insecure during the night. In addition a house fire and a barn fire were investigated. Other occurrences were of a minor nature.

Officers investigated 14 motor vehicle accidents which occurred this week of which number 6 resulted in injuries to eight persons. The remaining eight were property damage only. Total damage in all accidents were estimated to be approximately \$13,880. Two of the mishaps occurred on private property, and one was hit and run. Careless driving was the main cause of collision. Others were caused by improper turns, failure to share half of the road and tire blow out. One car was completely destroyed by fire. Charges were laid against 7 drivers after investigations were completed.
