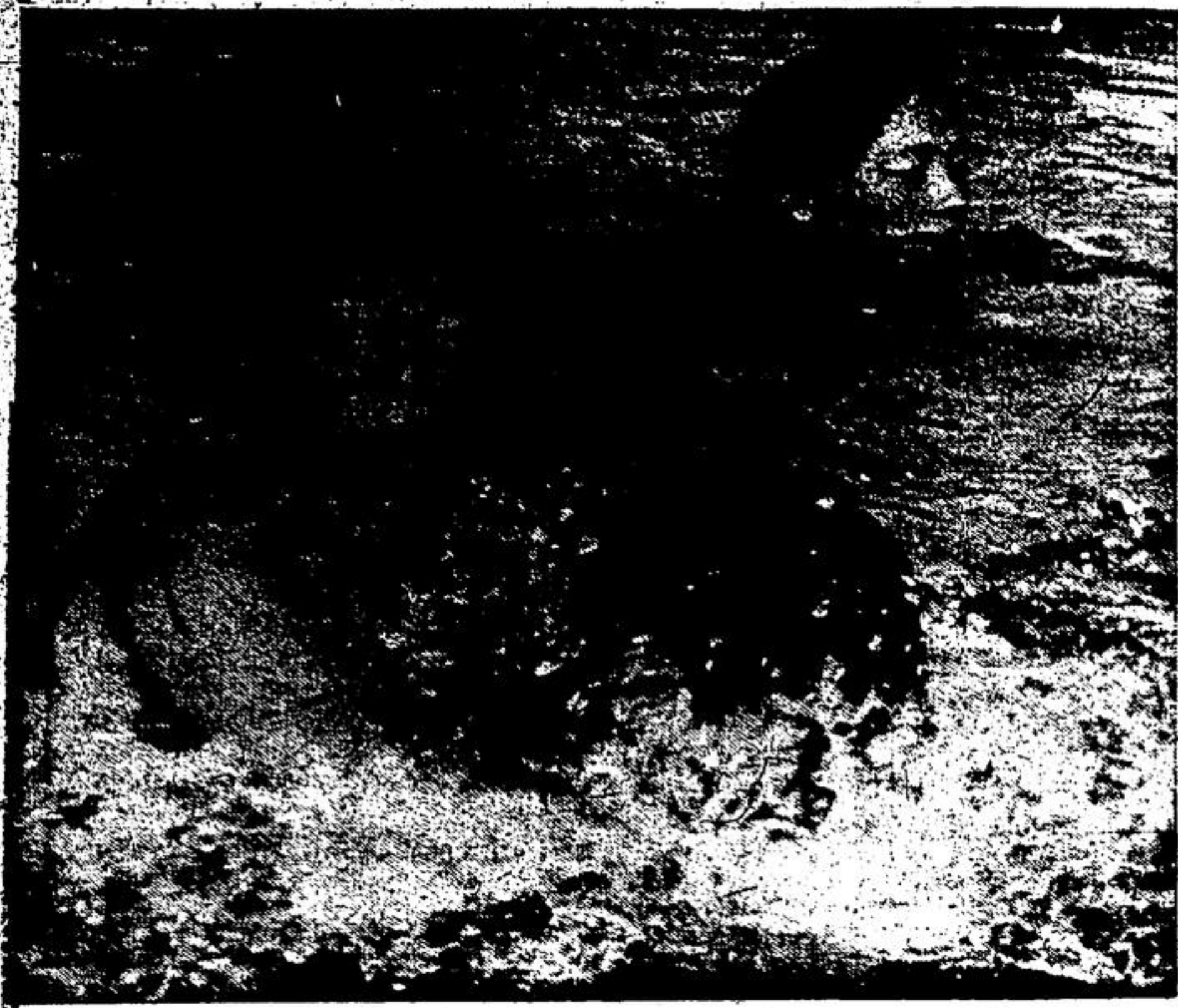

Twenty Pound Pike Angler's Prize Catch

A 20 lb. 42" northern pike was caught near Elk Lake after a furious battle by John Tost of 29 Normandy Blvd.

John intends to have the catch mounted by Reg Tomlinson of Baldwin.

Later on I hope to see the trophy in The Herald office window on display. Pike of this size are really not common. It was caught in the Montreal River.

Many big pike are caught in Cooks Bay of Lake Simcoe.

John caught his trophy on a voblex spinner. To quote John the big pike of the Montreal River are very savage. They are noted for robbing anglers of smaller fish such as bass and perch also smaller pike.

The name Nakina is not a strange name to many Georgetown people. To them it means the start of a trip by aircraft into the fabulous Albany River watershed for big pike, white fish, lake trout and trophy speckled trout. Many times I have seen Wilderness Airways advertised in our outdoor magazines.

WOOD DUCK

Indisputably the drake Wood Duck is the most beautiful of all our wild fowl. It has always been persecuted by man, not alone for its flesh, which is good but for its feathers which are used in the making of artificial trout flies, and for collections which, when carefully mounted by the taxidermist, it adorns.

The makers of artificial flies, used by anglers, would pay from \$3 to \$4 for a prime, full-plumaged skin of a male Wood Duck. The light and dark Cahill flies and quill — Gordon flies were made from the breast and sides of the bird. They nest in trees and old stumps. One nest was noticed 22 feet above a concrete sidewalk. Apparently no injuries to the ducklings were noticed when the mother called from the ground for them to jump. They just seemed to bounce and walk away.
