

### THE DISTRICT AT A GLANCE

**ACTON**—A swampy area which has long been an eyesore inside the main entrance to the Beardmore Tannery premises has been pumped out and dredged to create a small landscaped lake. Of late it has been populated by 150 Rain-bow trout, two swan cygnets, compliments of Mr. and Mrs. G. Bennett of Scotsdale Farm, a pair of Muscovy ducks, two pairs of Canada geese and five wild ducks, Mallards and Redheads. The project was undertaken to mark the 125th anniversary of Beardmore's.

**CAMPBELLVILLE**—A spectacular fire near Campbellville levelled a large barn and driving shed and claimed the lives of 13 valuable race horses recently. Glen Anderson, who rented the quarters from Lorne Hull for the boarding and training of horses, was at Greenwood Raceway with two horses when the fire occurred. The loss has been estimated at \$100,000.

**ROCKWOOD**—Riders from the Rockwood Trail Riders horsemanship club cleaned up on many of the competitions at the Kinsmen Club 30 mile trail ride in Flesherston last week. There were 58 entries in four divisions and the Rockwood Club had winners in all of them. The ride started at Eugenia Park and wound thru the Beaver Valley.

**ERIN**—The Erin Soaring Society has a sleek new \$7,500 glider. The craft was made in Czechoslovakia and shipped to Toronto. The wooden crate in which the glider was shipped was alone worth \$500. Club members are thrilled with the big bird which has a wing span of 57 feet. A handful of soaring enthusiasts organized the club three years ago, and since then it has grown steadily to its current membership of 37.

**STREETSVILLE**—Erindale College expects its student body to more than double

this term from last year's 470 to an anticipated 1,000 persons. About 85 per cent of the student body comes from Mississauga and Etobicoke. This week the registration total stood at 900.

**MILTON**—One person was injured and a sewage pumping station demolished when an explosion blew out brick walls and lifted the roof of the small building. Damage was placed at close to \$15,000. George Prior, a works employee, suffered second degree burns to his arms and legs and 30 per cent of his body. His face was scorched as well.

**BRAMPTON**—Councillor Irene Biggs wants a policy set preserving Brampton's tree-lined streets. She suggests a tree be planted for one removed and plans to make such a resolution to council shortly. She wants agreements with developers, to include requirements for one tree per property and four to six trees at high rise complexes. This year Brampton budgeted \$8,000 for trees. To date \$3,500 has been spent — all for removal.

### EVERYTHING 'UP' AT HOSPITAL

Admissions to Georgetown & District Memorial Hospital in 1969 has increased by 188 to date as compared to the same period in 1968, according to figures released this week.

Also notably up is the number of births, 198 to date compared to 164 last year at this time.

The figures include the first seven months of the year, the period ending July 31st.

They showed the occupancy rate for the year stands at 80 per cent, also an increase over the corresponding period in 1968 when it was 76.1.

When analyzed by type of accommodation this year's occupancy rate is as follows: medical and surgical wards 89 per cent; maternity ward 50 per cent; children's ward 81 per cent.
