Top Hereford, Reserve Champion at CNE Show

A Hereford steer, shown by Miss Liz Pitfield at the Canadian National Exhibition, has garnered honours for Tweedhill Farms, Terra Colla, and for Norval's Locust Farm where it was bred.

The steer was top Hereford in the show and was judged reserve grand champion of all breeds.

Miss Pitfield is the daughter of Toronto stockbroker Ward Pitfield, who owns Tweedhill Farms.

The calf was sired by Fairview Mischief, a bull in the herd of C.F. (Pat) Patterson at Norval. It was the second time a Locust Lane steer had topped the Hereford class at the CNE.

Mr. Patterson started breeding Herefords in 1950 and now has over 100 head on his farm carrying his own tattoo. His bull battery includes a CMR Perf. bull which he purchased through Munroe ranch at Senatobia, Mississippi.

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
