This concludes a series of letters written to her daughter in Vancouver by Mrs. Mildred Bellegem of Mississauga, in which she recalls her ancestors, the Erwins, many of whom lived in this district.

How does my space grandson, Alan Grafton, view the pictures from Mars? And tell my son in law, Bill, not to get ideas about parking "Mother-in-law off to the Moon!" — rather make it a trip up the Okanagan Valley. This is certainly an age of wonder, an interesting time to be alive in an old College Science Book of 1915 (in summation of a paper on Mars) the author states: "All talk of Martian inhabitants is the height of absurdity." Time will tell, eh!

We had a lovely visit with Dorothy Scott from Chilliwack, B.C. on Sunday, July 27th. Our intentions were to go and see the "dry falls" then picnic at Queenston Heights, but it rained so hard, we picnicked in our living room and viewed the movies of the Falls (the film I took when you were here). We reminisced over old pictures, and Grafton Family History. Dorothy had to go back to BC on Monday. Don't forget to call to see her when you go up that way again, Bill.

And now, more on the Erwin family — from information obtained at the Ontario Archives, I have pieced a Family Tree. There are bound to be errors or omissions, and I welcome correctors, also, I would be pleased to receive names and dates which might be added to this one.

From Perkins Bull's Papers

"Interview with Mr. William A. Irwin, March 16th, 1933:

Name in full is Wm. Alex Irwin.

Names of parents are William Erwin and Jane Perry.

Place of residence, lot 4, con. 8.

I am a farmer on the same lot my grandfather, Alexander, took up the farm in 1817 as a general farm.

The buildings are a stone house and a good frame barn.

I raised cattle and horses — (messenger horses).

I opened a hotel in Palgrave. I was educated in No. 1 Mono School and No. 9 School near Palgrave.

We are Presbyterians. My wife is Liza Wilson, born 1872, on lot 30, Conc. 5, Albion.

Her parents, Lyons Wilson and Hanna White resided on the same lot. My wife educated at S. S. 12, Albion. We have one daughter, Wilamena Alexandra Audrey Alice.

My hobby is fishing, sports, athletic. I was a member of the 'Onion Shiners' at Mono Mills. I could run 100 yards in 10 seconds. The organizer of this club was Joseph Mills, who organized it in 1880. We played football. Joseph Mills introduced football. We first played against the 'B' team and it was a one sided game. The score was something like 3-6. We were successful.

The team is now broken up. We won some prizes. There were about twelve in the club when we started but there were about 35-40 members when it broke up in 1890. Joseph Mills was a prominent man in the club. We generally played on the same lot. It was a large field, we had about one and one half acres to play on.

Mr. Bull asked "re Alex Irwin who came to Canada in 1817-1818 are the same Alex and Maryann buried in the Churchville Cemetery, the same Alex and his wife? (lot 4, Con. 8, Mono Twp., Dufferin County.) Answer: "Yes"

"Alex Irwin Gome changed name from 'E' to 'I' on coming to Canada came to Canada in 1817) and took crown land in lot 4, Conc. 8.

His bride was Mary Ann Wilson — they came from Armagh — settled and raised family and died there."

From Perkins Bull's Book —

"From Strachan to Owen" p. 430 "Oliver Matson contributes data regarding the founding of St. Alban's, Palgrave (290 by the Taylors, Rolleys, Shores and others, referring specially to Lyons Wilson's share in the actual building. There was some doubt as to the location. Only a few bodies now remain in the old churchyard of St. Alban's, Palgrave — p. 420). In the eighties complaints were made that wells in the neighbourhood were being polluted. In 1925, Dr. A. F. Reynar, Robert J. Lavery and George Wilson, son of Lyons Wilson, bought 'Morningside Cemetery' and the controversy was finally settled."

Brownridge, Mrs. Gordon Wingfield reported for the flower committee, some enjoyable musical numbers were given by Grace Bird on her electric steel guitar, Carolyn Bird on her accordion and piano duets by Karen and Dale Wickson, after which came the treat of the evening when Mrs. Wilbert Cleave showed her colored slides of their trip to Hawaii, this past spring. She told how they left Toronto by plane to Chicago then to Los Angeles and the State of Hawaii, then to Honolulu.

We saw pictures of Disneyland, the Hollywood Bowl, Lucille Ball's lovely home, Lana Turner's dressing room, and beautiful flowers and fruits that grow in those countries. Some pictures of San Francisco, Chicago and then Mallon Airport back home. Mrs. James Carney thanked the hostess and all who had any part in the evening's entertainment after which all sang "O Canada" and meeting closed with a social hour.

Grades Nine, and Ten Students at Nine a.m. Grades Eleven, Twelve and Thirteen Students at 1.00 p.m.

Buses will make one pickup only on Opening Day

Students will go directly to the classroom assigned to them according to the lists posted in the entrance foyer for Grades 9 and 11 and on the Gym corridor wall for Grades 10, 12 and 13. Students not on these lists will report to the library.

All Grade Nine, Ten, Eleven and Twelve Text Books will again be provided by The School Board. **A Student Losing or Damaging any of these books will be assessed for this loss or damage.** Students owing the school for books damaged or lost during the past school year will be asked to pay for them before registering. All books provided will be collected after examinations next June, or when a student leaves this school.

Students contemplating a change in their programme are asked to contact Mr. Prouse at the school (877-6966)

This year we will again have three lunch periods. The first lunch period will be from 11.03 to 11.44, second lunch period from 11.44 to 12.25, and the third lunch period from 12.25 to 1.06. Approximately one third of the classes will go to lunch at a time, and the remaining two thirds will remain in class. This means that regular classes will be going on all day. The school will finish regular classes at 3.09 and the buses will start to leave at 3.45. The lunch period for an individual class may vary from day to day, depending on the timetable.

"Students residing within the following boundaries will be transported to the Georgetown District High School, South side of No. 7 Highway from the easterly limits to Sinclair Avenue; south on Mountainview to and including Eden Place"

ROUTE 3: South on 9th Line to Glen Williams, leaving the Glen at 8.10 a.m. to School.

ROUTE 4: East on Highway 7 to Norval; South on Town Line to lot No. 9; North on Town Line to 10 Side Road; West on 10 Side Road to 9th Line; East to Norval at 8.30 a.m.; West on Highway 7 to School.

ROUTE 5: North on 8th Line to 22 Side Road 8.10 a.m. — West on 22 Side Road to Highway 7 — South on Highway 7 to School.

Leaves Stewarttown School, North to Lot 22; East to 8th Line; South to Lot 21; East to Glen Williams School.
