He told The Herald this week that a fence should be around the perimeter of the twin

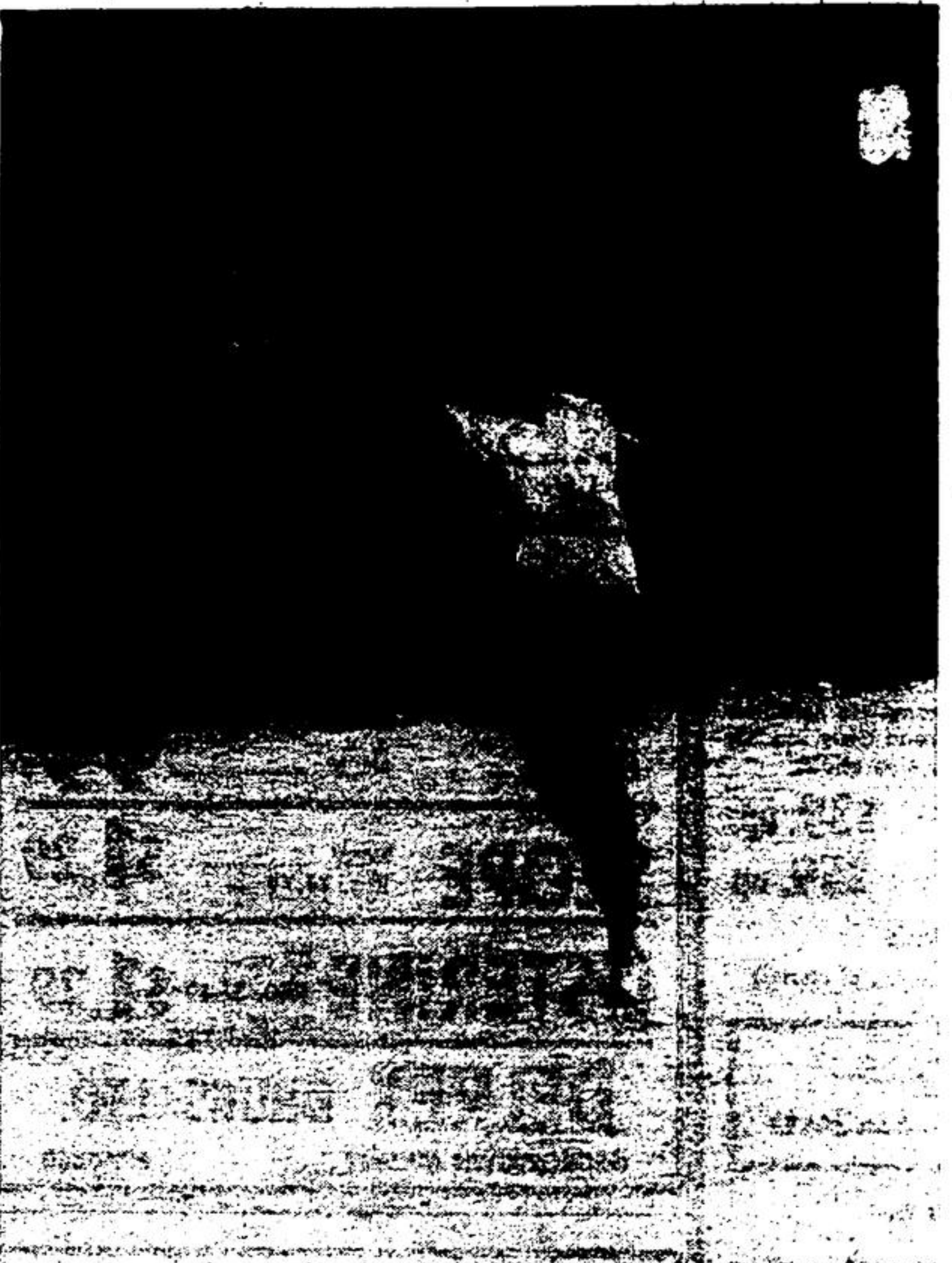
court this weekend leaving only the installation of nets.
