Bicycle Licenses Will Aid Theft Recoveries

All bicycles in Georgetown must bear licenses by Sept. 15 or owners may be liable to a \$5 fine.

A bicycle licensing by-law was passed Monday by Georgetown council. Georgetown Police Commission recommended the preparation of a bicycle licensing by-law several months ago.

Police Chief Harley Lowe told The Herald bicycle licenses will aid greatly in cutting down bike thefts and in locating the owners of found and recovered two wheelers.

Bike owners will get their licenses, and a plate to be affixed to their bikes, by applying to the Georgetown Police Department, completing a form and paying a \$1.00 fee.

The licenses will expire yearly on September 15.

Police Department figures for 1968 showed 135 bikes stolen of which 90 were recovered and returned to their owners. Forty five were never traced.

Bikes for which the police can't find owners are sold by auction.

Five Gold Medals for Georgetown Track Star

Tonny Powell, the Georgetown runner who likes to strengthen his legs by sprinting up a steep ravine behind his home at 4 Chipper Court, was running in high gear at the Canada Games.

Powell captured four gold medals for Ontario and was awarded a fifth for being a member of the winning province.

His gold medals were earned in the 200 metres sprint (47.5), the 400 metres (21.4), the 400 metre relay, and the 1500 metre relay.

Powell became the first double gold medal winner Friday when he won the 200 metre race after making a slow start. He committed a second cardinal sin when he looked over his shoulder toward the finish to see who was behind him. Normally, either one of those moves would be enough to kill any sprinter's chances, but not Powell's.

"I'm never known to have a tremendous start," the 5 ft. 10, 165 pound redhead admitted. "I'm notoriously bad in fact, but this year I've been working on it and was improving. The start was like one I would have made last year."

But Powell turned on a tremendous burst of speed and had a clearcut lead 50 yards from the tape.

That's when he turned around.

"On an eight lane track," he said, "in a race where there are only one or two that are going to beat you, I don't care what they say you've got to know where they are. Because of the wide track I had to turn around to see."

Lately, whenever he has been home on week-ends, Powell has trained by running straight up the incline behind Chipper Court ten times.
