Several competitors from Halton County competed in the dairy classes at the CNE.

In the Holstein section Howard Tarzwell exhibited the first prize bull calf which went on to be the Reserved Junior Champion. Tarzwell was also 4th in the Junior Yearling class 11th in Senior Yearling and 2nd in the 4 Year Old Class.

Claude Picket placed 3rd — 2 year old, 4th and 5th — 3 year old, 12th — 4 year old, and 5th and 6th in the 5 year old classes.

Ashville Farms placed 3rd with their Aged Bull, with Bert Stewart placing 6th with his Senior Yearling Heifer. This heifer was Paul Stewart's 4th calf last year and was shown in the ring by Paul.

Some of the top animals were also bred in Halton County. The winning Grand Champion Bull, Haigertee Dale Ruben, was bred by Tom McGee; the first prize 2 year old was bred by Wm. Bennett; and 2nd place aged cow by Gordon R. Sinclair and Sons.

In the Jersey section B. H. Bull and Son won the Premier Breeder and Exhibitor Banners. Their cattle were 3rd in the bull calf, 15th for yearling female, 3rd — Junior yearling female, 7th and 16th — senior yearling female, 1st — 2 year old, 1st and 5th, 3 year old 19th 4 year old, 1st and 4th — 5 year old and first in breeders herd.

The 5 year old cow Brampton Aim R Carom was awarded the Grand Champion of the show. Rock Ella Jersey Farms Ltd. placed 1st and 2nd in the 4 year old class, 7th — bull calf, 8th — yearling bull, 6th — junior yearling female, 3rd — 2 year old, 9th and 13th — 3 year old, 15th — 5 year old, and 2nd in the breeders herd.
