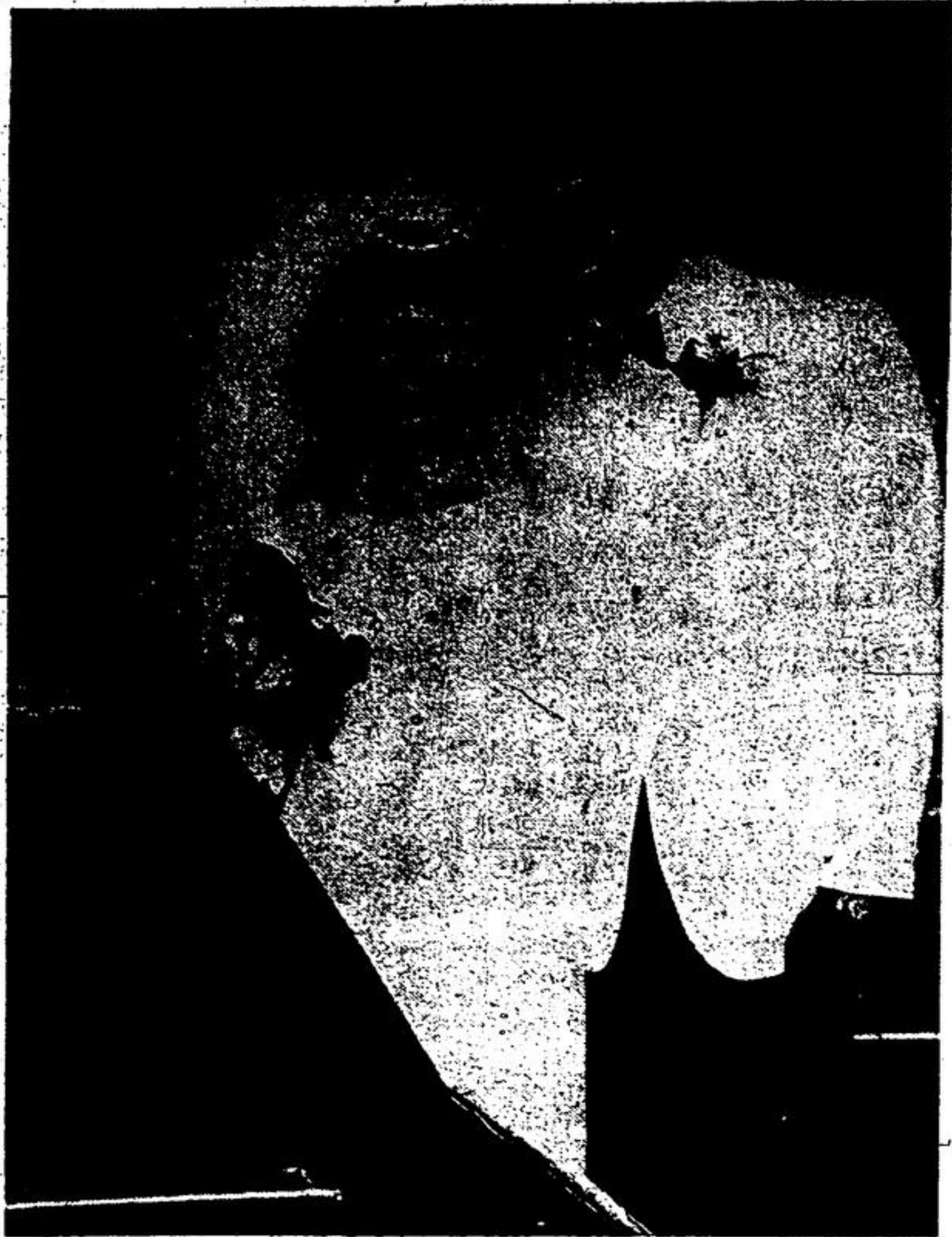


## GERALDINE KAVANAGH BRIDE NEW HOME IN MISSISSAUGA

## Mrs. Ernest Pearce Was Third Generation in Floral Business

Associated with her husband in operating Rosedale Floral since 1954, Mrs. Ernest Pearce, 32 Albert Street, died in Georgetown Hospital on August 24. She was 53.

The former Amy Margaret Fendley, she was a member of a Brampton family long associated with the flower business. She was named after her paternal grandmother, Amy Dale, one of the original members of Brampton's Dale Estate. Her father, the late C. R. Fendley had his own florist business in Brampton and she worked with him after her schooling in Brampton high school and Brampton Business College. She had been employed with a floral design firm, J. O. Granger Co. in Toronto and for three years before her marriage in 1941, she was manager of Amy Dale Flowers on St. Clair Avenue West in the city.

Born in Brampton, she spent her early childhood in Norval. After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Pearce lived in Brampton for two years where she was employed in the town's municipal office and registry department. In 1945 they moved to Collingwood where she managed Smart Brothers Florists for ten years.

She belonged to the Women's Institute and Rebekah Lodge there and was a member of a ladies' organization in All Saints Anglican Church. When she moved to Georgetown she continued to be active as an Institute and Rebekah member, holding several offices in the lodge, joined the Daughters of the Church at St. George's Anglican and the Rotary Annex.

An avid camper, she had belonged to the badminton, and tennis club of Grace United Church, Brampton, and the church CGIT. Flowers were her business and her hobby. She attended several schools in floral design at Guelph OAC and in Toronto. And she was much in demand as a speaker and demonstrator on floral arranging.

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## Special Lily Show is New Feature for Horticulturists

On a Wednesday evening in the middle of July the Georgetown Horticultural Society staged an extra-curricular event—several lily fanciers brought in for competition exhibits including many varieties of lilies making Knox Church Hall a colorful and scented room. The Society has never before held a flower show primarily for lilies.

It was however, considered an extra event for this year as interest in lily culture has grown somewhat in the district. R. S. Barber, chairman of the Flower Show Committee masterminded the compiling of an entry list and placing of entries for judging as his high amateur status in lily culture over many years qualified him for this extra task.

Mr. Barber is also president of the Ontario Regional Lily Society for 1969-70 and competes and wins with the best of the lily people throughout Ontario.

Fred Hayes of Burlington and Mr. Ross Martin of Binbrook were invited to judge the show and later congratulated the Society on an excellent show and further commented that they knew of no other Horticultural Society, at least in southern Ontario to even attempt one before. The apparent success of this evening could very well be an impetus to others in the future.

During the judging the Society members and friends gathered for a short meeting to catch up on society business and coming events. President, D. N. Cole called on Mrs. Wm. Boyle for a report of the delegates activities at the Ontario Horticultural Convention held in Hamilton in June. A report was given indicating the venture worthwhile for Mrs. Boyle, Mrs. W. C. Bradley and Mrs. J. Persons.

The president noticed the presence of Mrs. L. DeVries, a past president of the Society, and introduced her to the gathering. Mrs. DeVries spoke briefly of her interest in the Society while a resident of the district.

After the judging had been completed Mr. Martin and Mr. Hayes made themselves available to answer questions from the floor and also offered a few tips for future shows.

The next major event in the life of the Society will be the September Flower Show to be held in the Legion Hall downtown on Saturday afternoon, September 13th. It is hoped that all amateur gardeners in Town and District will avail themselves of the opportunity to compete and/or visit the show at any time. Competition at all Society Flower Shows is open to the general public. Membership in the Society is necessary however to become a recipient of awards and trophies.

R. S. Barber announced the winners of the high aggregate points gained in this show placing Miss Elsie J. Bird first, Mrs. H. Sienko second and Mrs. W. R. Norton in third place.

The meeting was adjourned to enable all to view the entries and enjoy refreshments and a chat.

Bennett, Gardhouse  
Are Shorthorn  
Winners at C.N.E.

S. G. Bennett's Scotsdale herd, of Georgetown, sparked a fine Shorthorn showing at the recent Canadian National Exhibition. Mr. Bennett was named Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor.

Wins from this herd included the junior and grand champion bull, Scotsdale Consort; the reserve junior and reserve grand champion bull, Scotsdale Citation; the reserve senior champion bull, Scotsdale Bullion, the senior and grand champion female, Scotsdale Uvira Rosebud, and the reserve junior champion female, Scotsdale Flossy Cora. Other Scotsdale wins included first in get of sire, pair of bulls, and group of four.

R. W. Gardhouse, Milton, was a contender throughout, winning first in 1968 female class with Aberfeldy Lady Tess 2nd, later going on to junior championship. Among the Gardhouse wins were: fourth in senior bull class; fifth junior yearling bull; second in group of four. This herd was also runner-up for the Premier Breeder Award.

Also from this general area Keith Hall, Ayr, had the fifth prize senior bull calf, McKenzie Hall, Ayr, showed the fourth place junior yearling bull, John McKinnon and R. Vanderkop, Milton, showed the fifth prize 1968 female.

This was a strong show with twenty breeders exhibiting one hundred and four Shorthorns.



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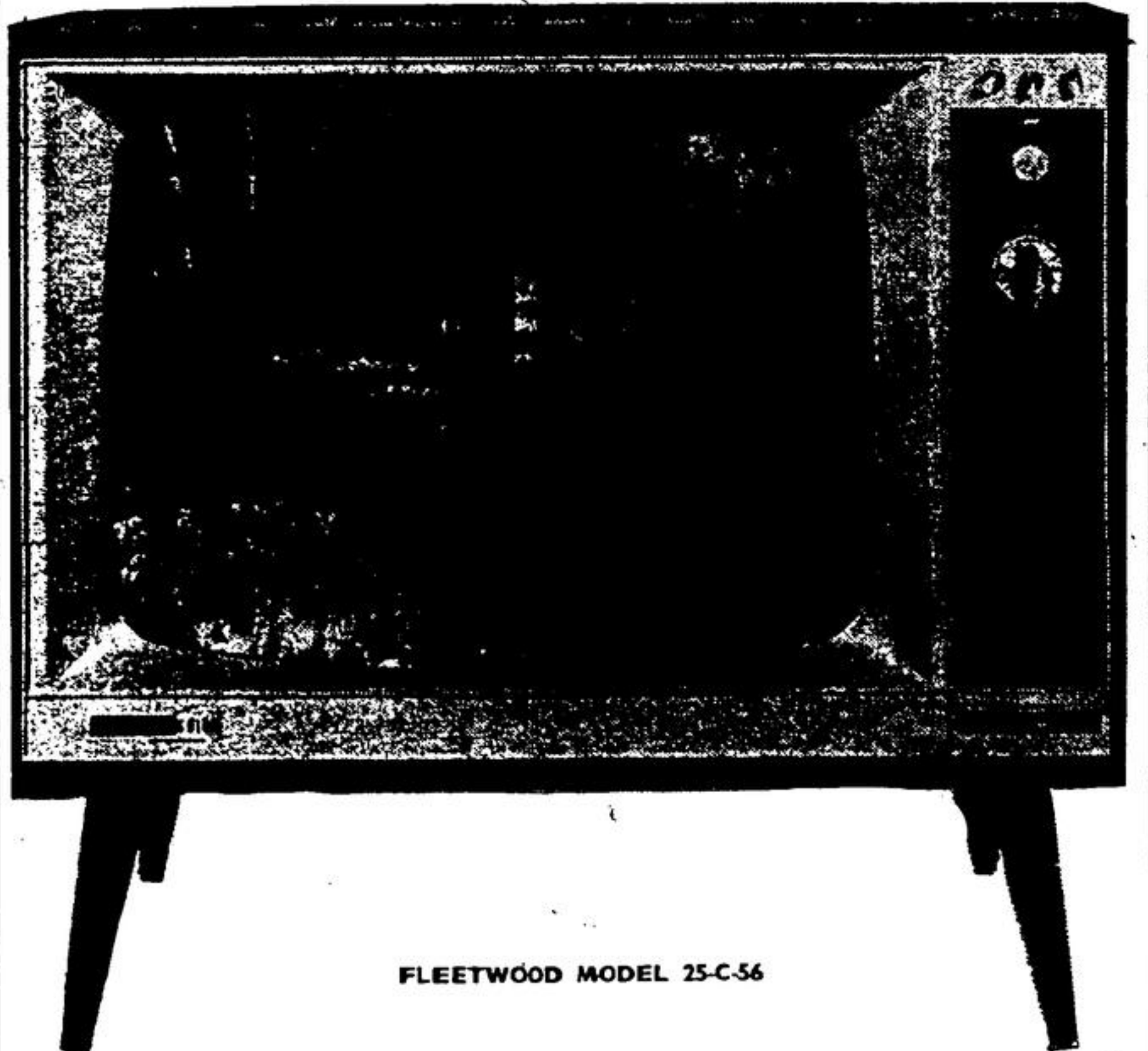
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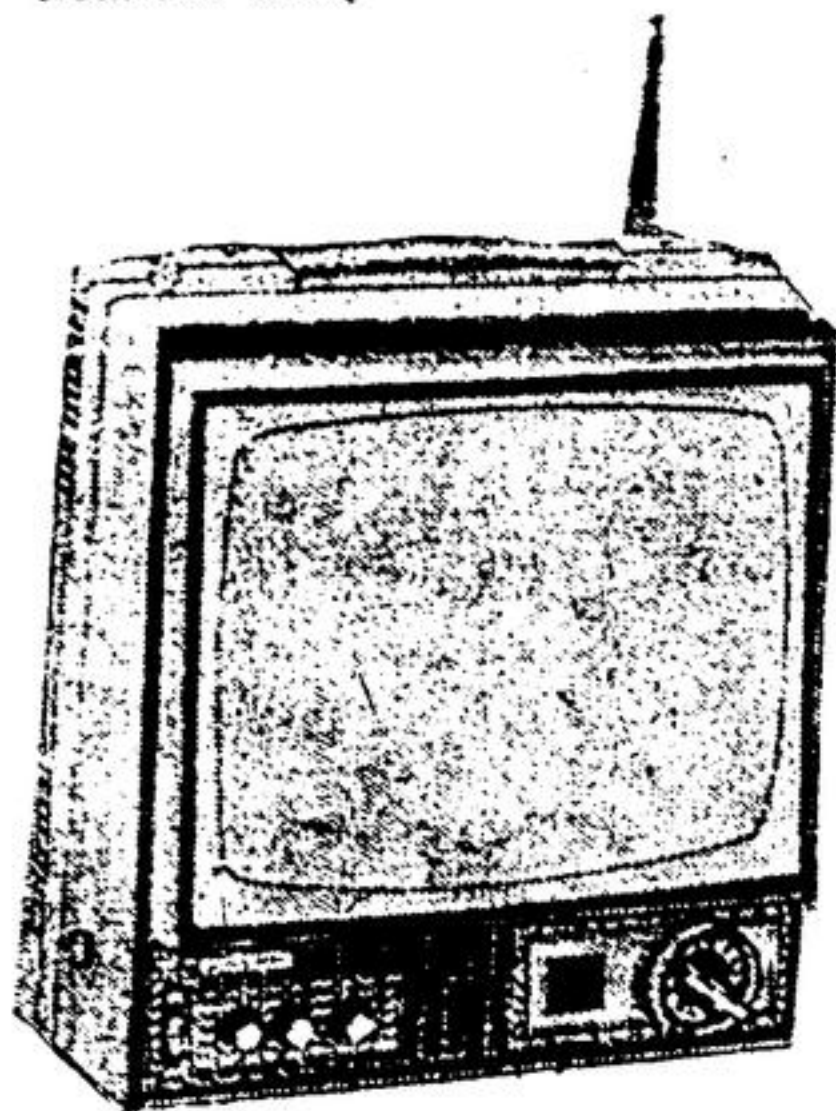
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
