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

# NEWS ECHOES

From the Heralds of 10, 20 and 30 Years Age

- Some 65 per cent of Georgetown householders have complied with post office regulations and installed letter box receptacles at their homes, according to an official count made by department authorities on August 13th. At least 85 per cent of town\_residents must comply be fore postal delivery can be inaugurated in town.
- St. Andrew's United Church has commenced marning worship services in their new church building at the corner of Sinclair Avenue and Mountainview Road. The new church, of modern design, was built by Zorge Con struction and is entirely portable. The sections are bolted together so that it can be moved to another site when St. Andrew's permanent building is constructed.

- Georgetowns new liquor store will be located in the Hewson building on Mill Street. A lease has been signed by the Liquor Control Board with Tom Heason, for rental of a portion of his building now occupied by Mr. Hewson's office
- · Since the inauguration of building permits in Georgetown on May 10th, permits totalling \$399,957 have been issued according to statistics from building inspecfor George Adams. House building operations have islackened this year as compared to 1948 when permits for 37 new homes were granted. To date in 1949 just 13 new house permits have been issued. Major items other than houses in 1948, were an addition to the Cordaro Building on Main St., the erection of a store and apartment building on King Street by Norman Hill; an addition to Georgetown Furniture Sales; an addition to the Exchange Hotel; and the building of a church hall at the United Church. This year's major projects includded an addition to the Muckart bldg. on Mill St. an addition to the Provincial Paper Mill; erection of a service station and restaurant by Fred Harrison, on the highway, and the remodelling of a building on Main Street ow red by Al Norton.
