

100 Years in Community Georgetown Fair Next Masons Building Temple Big Town Attraction

Marking 100 years establishment in the community, local Freemasons are opening and dedicating their new lodge hall, 'Credit Temple' this month.

Blasts Council— Blight Resigns Safety Post

Termining council bungling amateurs who have mismanaged town affairs far too long, Colin Blight, chairman of the Municipal Safety Committee, resigned from his position, in a letter to council, Monday night.

He claimed lack of co-operation from all members of council over the past year, maintained council regard the activities of safety committee as a waste of time. "I know full well that any recommendation from the committee will be completely ignored and passed off," continued the letter.

He concluded by saying his time was too valuable to be wasted, and ended with "Thank goodness regional government will take over within a few months and we shall be well rid of the bungling amateurs who have mismanaged town affairs far too long."

Council accepted the resignation with no comment.

Plans are taking shape for another record breaking fall fair in Georgetown on October 3-4.

Two big highlights will be the Jumping horses and the Quarter horse show. These two events are gaining momentum each year, and added to these are the classes for ponies and carriage horses.

A good prize list has been assembled for the ladies work division and this show in the hall should draw special attention, as well as the prize list for boys and girls exhibits.

Broadway Shows from Ottawa will again feature the midway attractions, and an effort is being made to engage talent for the main bleacher attraction. Vince Mountford will emcee the show and a program is also being arranged to complement the opening of the fair.

This is the 123rd annual fall fair, sponsored by the Georgetown Agricultural Society.
