## Homeless, Ate Garbage Man Finds Haven With Sally Ann

Provincial Judge James R. Black made several phone calls from his chambers during a court recess Wednesday in an attempt to find a home for a 65 year old man who shared his last "home" with rats and literally ate garbage.

The man came before Judge Black the week before after being picked up by Georgetown police on a charge of having no visible means of support and trespassing.

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The man came from British Columbia about a year ago, lived at the Esqueping Township dump for several months, living in a broken down old shack full of rats and piles of junk.

He would go through the dump for things to eat — mouldy bread, bad fruit.

When he appeared in court in his ragged clothes, Judge Black heard he had no money, no job, no family and no place to go.

The judge sent the grizzled man to county jail, "where at least you can get a square meal." Meanwhile, the judge said, he hoped some agency would come forward and offer to help the man.

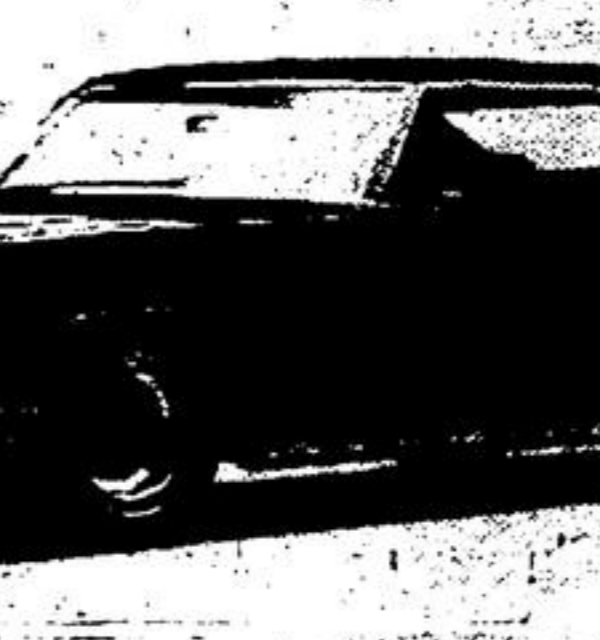
Wednesday, when the man came before the judge again to see what happens next, no-one had come forward to help him.

Judge Black said it was "too bad no social agency had come forward to help him, especially in view of the publicity given him."

He said he would make some calls himself during court recess. The judge made the calls and shortly afterwards Captain J. S. Johnson of the Oakville Salvation Army appeared at the jail and took away the man who lived with rats and ate garbage.

He was taken to the Salvation Army Hostel in Hamilton where he will have good meals and a proper bed.

## THE DISTRICT AT A GLANCE

### ROCKS FULL OF FOSSILS

Campbellville — Fossils probably dating back to Canada's ice age, turned up when County of Halton construction crews blasted away a rocky ridge north of Campbellville. George Robertson of the crew discovered a 25 foot long ridge of soft stone thickly imbedded with fossilized creatures. The rocks contained imprints of large clam-like shells and slender shelled animals.

### 159 HOME SUBDIVISION

Moffat — Nassagaweya council has passed a by-law paving the way for a 159 home subdivision to be built near the village of Moffat. The development, called Moffat estates, will include houses priced between \$25,000 and \$28,000. Construction on the first 50 homes is expected to start next spring.

### KELSO DREW BIG CROWD

Kelso — Some 23,608 cars entered the gates to the Kelso Conservation area during the May to September period. Dominion Day weekend saw 2,398 cars pass through the gates; 1,629 came through during the Civic Holiday and 2,160 for the Labour Day weekend.

### SUSPECT WEED SPRAY

Malton — The deaths of three horses in three weeks at the Double H riding stables are still unexplained. But an autopsy is being conducted on one of the horses to see if weed spray used by the Town of Mississauga poisoned them. Romeo Francoeur, the owner, said one horse died two weeks ago, another last week and the third this week. Last month, Mississauga began a blitz of weed spraying.

### BELWOOD LAKE PROJECT

Belwood — The Grand River Conservation Authority will empty Belwood Lake next month. By emptying the lake, the authority can proceed with aerial contour mapping of the lake, and can also paint the gates of the Shand Dam.

### KEEP CP STATION OPEN

Milton — Milton's CPR station will remain open but the agent will be removed when the railway opens its Customer Service Centre at London according to an order of the Railway Transport Committee. The railway plan is to service the Milton area from the Customer Service

Centre in London. The station will be kept clean, heated and lighted according to the committee order.

### CARNY WORKER STABBED

Brampton — A knife fight in Brampton last week resulted in the arrest of a 21 year old carnival worker after one man suffered a stomach wound in town to work at the Brampton Fair midway, two workers were in a fist fight when one man pulled a knife and stabbed the other in the stomach. The wound required nine stitches. The other man was charged with wounding and will appear in court this week.

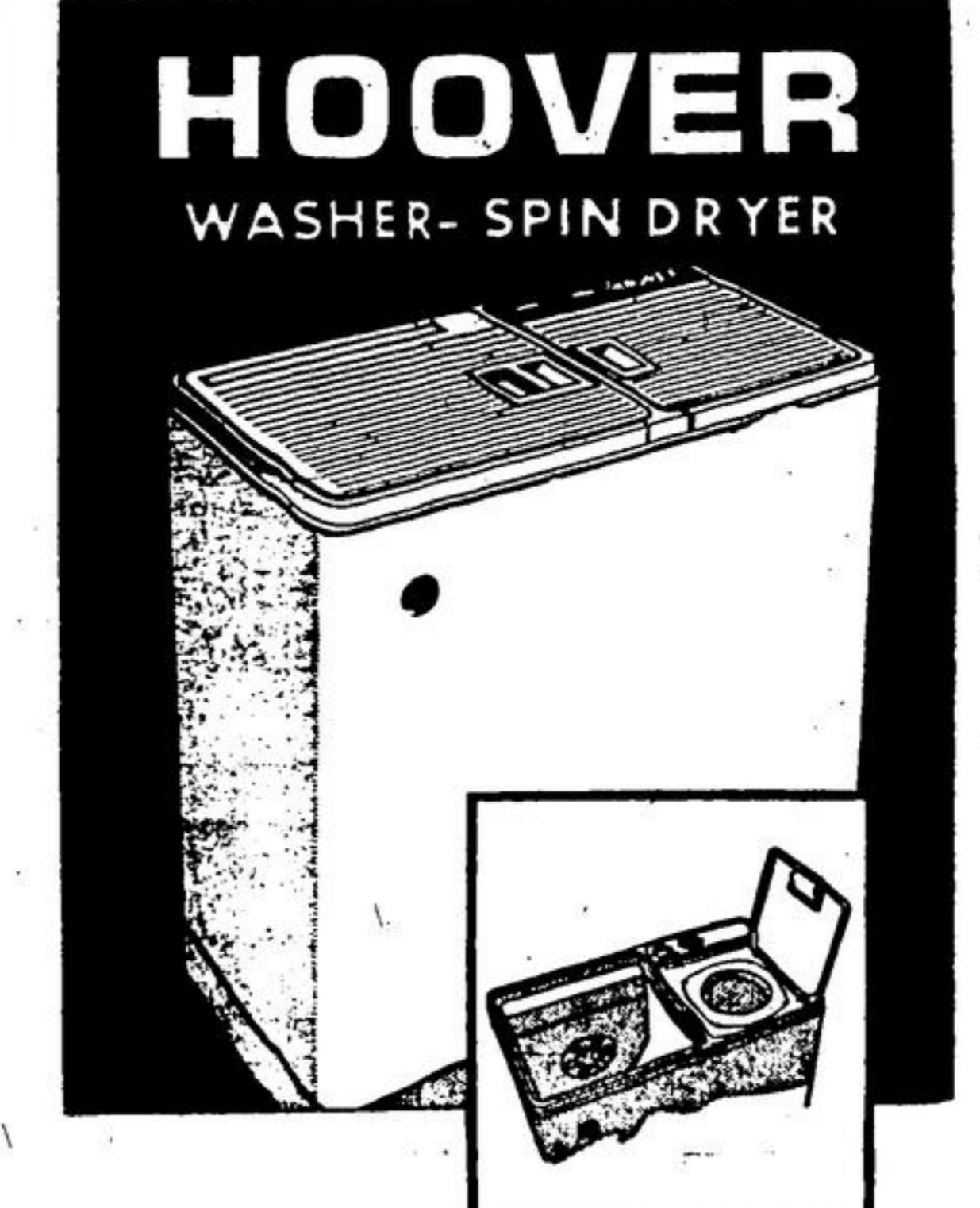
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
